# WARD SYSTEM 101

### WHAT IS THE WARD SYSTEM?

- Philadelphia is divided into 66 geographic regions called Wards
- The Wards are divided into between 10 and 50 smaller areas called divisions
- Each division (1,686 in total) is represented by two committee people per political party
- Committee people represent their neighbors as their party's political block captain!

#### WHAT IS A COMMITTEE PERSON?

Committee people are:

- A political party's representative in each voting division
- A point of contact between voters, elected officials and the party

Committee people are volunteer party officers, not public officials or government employees. Most committee people are paid around \$100 for each election, and that money comes from the party, not taxpayers

### WHAT DO COMMITTEE PEOPLE DO?

The expectations and responsibilities of committee people vary depending on the ward but include:

- Electing your Ward Leader
- Endorsing candidates
- Heading a voter registration drive in your neighborhood
- Circulating nomination petitions for your party's candidates
- Giving voters info (election date, polling place, candidates) about an upcoming election
- Distributing absentee and alternative ballot applications before an election
- Recruiting Election Day poll watchers for candidates in your division
- Working with neighbors, block captains and community groups to help solve problems

## WHO CAN RUN FOR COMMITTEE PERSON?

To run for Committee Person you have to be:

- A registered voter in the division you wish to represent
- Registered as a member of the political party you are seeking to represent

Committee people serve four year terms with no term limits

(Note: If you are an unelected city official or city employee, you are prohibited from many political activities, including serving as a committee person. For more detailed information about political activity restrictions for city officials and employees, contact the Philadelphia Board of Ethics or Office of the Chief Integrity Officer.)
