August 20th - Meet a Second Candidate, George Walish, opposing Andy Harris!


We had a fabulous turnout at our June membership meeting to meet candidate Dan Schwartz, running against Andy Harris, District 1. Join us on August 20th to meet a second registered candidate, George Walish, also running to unseat Andy Harris. The meeting will be at 7 PM, Kent Island Library.

Eastern Shore resident and longtime business executive George M. Walish Jr. has filed with the Maryland State Board of Elections as a Democratic candidate for Maryland's 1st Congressional District, formally launching his campaign to unseat Republican Rep. Andy Harris in the 2026 election.

Walish, of Earleville, is a former senior executive at BMW of North America and a former elected commissioner of the Town of St. Michaels, Walish brings decades of leadership across education, labor, and industry to his first bid for federal office.

"I believe we can do better—for our working families, for the health of the Chesapeake Bay, and for the small towns and rural communities that make this district special," Walish said. "I'm running to bring open, honest, and accountable leadership to Washington—and to make sure the voices of Eastern Shore and upper Baltimore County residents are heard."

On September 2nd, we will be providing delicious homestyle meals from Humble Hearts Catering out of Centreville, including



Protesting on the Shore: Bring a sign and show solidarity

Where can you attend three protests in eight days, and eat ice cream with likeminded souls? On Maryland's Eastern Shore, of course!

Thoughts from veteran activist and board member Marti MacKenzie

As the Trump administration continues its overreach to destroy all that is good and kind about our country, citizens are speaking up and taking to the streets. More and more protest rallies from major blue cities to small red communities are happening, often as immediate reactions to the growing chaos and cruelty from D.C.

The Eastern Shore is not remaining quiet, despite having elected one of Congress' most dangerous radical-right MAGA Trump devotees. There were issue-focused rallies beginning in the spring, from "Hands Off," "No Kings," and "50 rallies in 50 states in one day." The national progressive non-profit Indivisible has provided the framework to make organizing in communities easier with Indivisible groups formed in Worchester, Talbot and Caroline Counties, Salisbury(DelMarVa), Cambridge, and Kent Island (Eastern Shore Indivisible), among others.

Although the various activities on the Eastern Shore are still lacking one umbrella coordinating group, you can check all the websites to receive information and alerts. For instance, from July 17-25 I managed to attend a general sign-waving event in Cambridge, a protest at an Andy Harris fundraiser scheduled in Trappe (they heard we were coming, moved to Cambridge, and we followed), and a large protest in Easton demanding the release of a local pastor who was detained by ICE. The same week, our QA Dems ate ice cream, shared stories, and re-energized.

Yes, Protests Can Bring Change

Many of us grew up in the Vietnam-era and got our feet wet protesting an end to the war and the military-industrial complex. We did make a difference that brought an end to that war. We knew protesting had value and have taken to the streets since in support of civil rights, climate justice, and gun violence. Even the far-right made effective uses of protest as part of the Tea Party and right-to-life movement. Seasoned activists realize, however, that protests are only effective as part of a goal-driven movement. Professor Michael Lipsky wrote an influential article titled "Protest as a Political Resource," in which he argued that successful movements have clear strategic goals, seek to enlist more powerful individuals in their cause, and connect expressions of discontent to broader political and electoral mobilization. It just takes 3.5 percent

David Robson wrote for the BBC that nonviolent protests are twice as likely to succeed as armed conflicts. In 1986, millions of Filipinos took to the streets of Manila in peaceful protest and prayer in the People Power Movement. The Marcos' regime folded on the fourth day. Protests resulted in the ousters of leaders in Sudan, Algeria and Georgia. At least 3.5 percent of Egyptians protested in the early 2010s, sparking the Arab Spring. The Center for American Progress is among those who conclude that if 3.5 percent of Americans – 12 million people – mobilize to peacefully protest the authoritarian actions of the Trump Administration it would virtually be impossible for the government to ignore their demands.

In my case, I am a Unitarian Universalist pacifist who follows the teachings of Gandhi. I cannot sit by and watch injustices without doing something. I write letters, make phone calls, sign petitions, canvas, work campaigns, lobby Congress, and protest against social injustices. I have been arrested in four different actions in our nation's capitol and traveled to other states for political actions.


I have talked to many concerned citizens on the Eastern Shore who share my concerns; "What can we do?," they say. As a Democratic group, we can provide opportunities to "do something." We have postcard writing and data-entry for our mailing list most every Tuesday at QAC Dems headquarters in Queenstown; we promote the monthly sign-waving resistance protests in Centreville (second Saturdays, 9-10:30 am); have tabling events at celebrations like Juneteenth and the county fair; we have introduction, support and training workshops for candidates; our meetings feature speakers on issues and candidates for offices; and we can highlight protests that members can attend.

There were some who felt the mass gatherings around the Harris-Walz campaigns were not that effective with voters, but they were important as part of a goal-driven campaign. Now the resistance campaign against global chaos, human suffering, and the demise of rule-of-law must continue. Peaceful protests show solidarity and can be an effective weapon. All it takes is making a sign and showing up. See you there.

Editorial: The OBBBA is Big, But Cutting Supplemental Food Benefits for Kids is Not Beautiful

The Secretary of Agriculture maintains that the Administration's One Big Beautiful Bill Act, signed into law on July 4, 2025, (<u>H.R.1 - 119th Congress (2025-2026)</u>: One Big Beautiful Bill Act I Congress.gov I Library of Congress) "realigns" the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) to the President's "mission of cutting waste, fraud and abuse across the federal bureaucracy." According to the Secretary, the revised rules will "incentivize" states to distribute SNAP funds only to those who qualify and will expand work requirements for able-bodied adults without dependents. As the Secretary puts it, "[w]elfare should be a helping hand not a pathway to lifelong dependency." https://www.usda.gov/about-usda/news/press-releases/2025/06/30/icymi-secretary-rollins-op-ed-newsweek-farmers-win-one-big-beautiful-bill.

SNAP recipients who are able-bodied adults without dependents already had work-related requirements in addition to having to meet SNAP work registration, employment and income eligibility requirements. OBBBA eligibility revisions change already existing work requirements for these individuals (80 hours a month or 20 hours a week) to include able-bodied adults who are 65 years old and younger (prior law was age 55 and younger) and parents with dependents age 14 and older (prior law exempted parents with a child under the age of 18). In addition, the new law generally requires homeless individuals, veterans, and certain foster care individuals to meet the new work requirements. Foster care individuals are those who are 24 years old or younger and were in foster care on the date of attaining age 18. https://www.congress.gov/bill/119th-congress/house-bill/1

Cost-sharing revisions under the new law include shifting costs from the federal to the state government. Under prior law, administrative costs of the program were split 50-50 between the federal and state governments and the federal government paid for the actual benefit. Under the new law, the state will pay 75% of administrative costs and up to 15% of the benefit depending upon the state's payment error rate.

Of the more than 680,000 Maryland residents that now depend in part on supplemental food benefits, more than 270,000 are children.

Congressman Harris supported the OBBBA, observing that the "Welfare Reform & Work Requirements" were "significantly tightened" while making its way through the House of Representatives, and that the bill, as enacted, cuts waste, fraud and abuse in the food stamp program. https://harris.house.gov/media/press-releases/one-big-beautiful-bill-secures-major-wins-american-people.

Nobody supports waste, fraud, and abuse. It is not clear though that any of the 270,000 Maryland children who may be affected by the SNAP changes – or their parents and caregivers - engaged in any such conduct. It is also not clear that children were an important consideration in the Administration's zeal to reduce benefits. Sending any child to bed or to school hungry is something to be actively avoided – not just collateral damage in the effort to offset the cost of giving tax breaks to the country's biggest earners.
