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SUMMARY

The DemosAU survey of 2,974 Queenslanders in October 2025 reveals clear and consistent public sentiment across all demographic and state voting intention cohorts in favour of environmental protection and sustainable timber practices.

While there are some differences by voting intention, broad support exists among Labor, Greens, and many LNP voters for transitioning away from native forest logging and investing in plantation forestry and timber manufacturing.

Majority support for ending logging

A central finding is the majority support for ending native forest logging, shared across the political spectrum. Overall, 56% of Queenslanders agreed that logging in publicly owned native forests should end, compared with just 14% who disagreed. This included near-unanimous support among Greens voters (71% agreement) and strong backing among Labor supporters (62% agreement).

Even among LNP voters (50% agreement)—typically less supportive of environmental restrictions—half expressed agreement with ending logging, suggesting that concern for forest protection is widespread.

Similarly, when asked about reducing native forest logging on publicly owned land, support remained high across voter groups. Net agreement reached roughly +48% overall, with strong endorsement from Greens (around +50%) and Labor voters (+61%). Among LNP supporters there was still a decisive majority in favour of reducing native forest logging on publicly owned land at +39% and among One Nation supporters at +41%.

In contrast, pluralities of Queenslanders were against proposals to expand native forest logging or issue new logging permits to private companies were consistently unpopular across all voting blocs. Both measures registered net negative sentiment of -12%.

Support crosses geographic divides

These results also reveal support for ending native forest logging crosses regional divides, with limited fluctuation. In Brisbane, 72% of people agree with a phase out, with only 7% disagreeing. In regional areas, support is slightly higher, including among north and central Queensland residents (72% agree, 5% disagree) and those in Wide Bay (75% agree, 7% disagree).

Gold Coast residents are the least supportive of a phase out, but even here supporters outnumber opponents 69%-9%.

SUMMARY

Queenslanders back incentives to grow plantations industry

Support for providing incentives to grow more plantation forests for timber was overwhelming—around 70–80% agreement across all demographic and voter groups. Similarly, a large majority supported government efforts to help Queensland businesses manufacture more products from plantation timber, such as modular housing and engineered wood. These results indicate that plantation forestry and local manufacturing are compatible with economic growth, regional employment, and environmental responsibility.

When presented with the idea of growing enough plantation timber to meet all of Queensland's housing needs, total agreement reached 78%. This convergence suggests that the notion of a sustainable, homegrown timber industry enjoys near-universal political appeal.

Environmental protection a greater priority than timber production

Finally, when asked to prioritise the purpose of publicly owned native forests, environmental protection was the dominant choice across every political cohort. 61% of respondents ranked environmental protection as most important, followed by much smaller shares for timber production (20%) and recreation (19%). Pairwise comparisons confirmed this hierarchy: most voters—irrespective of state voting intention—preferred environmental protection over logging, and a majority also ranked it above recreational use.

In summary, while intensity of support varies by political leaning, this polling data shows that Queenslanders across the political spectrum back a transition from native forest logging to plantation-based timber production and manufacturing. Environmental protection is seen as a shared value rather than a partisan issue, with strong public demand for policies that combine conservation, sustainable industry, and long-term timber security.
