## **OUR MISSION**

The purpose of Rainbow Families is to build a community that fosters resiliency by connecting, supporting and empowering LGBTQ+ parents and their children

Rainbow Families is the peak organisation supporting lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer (LGBTQ+) parents and their children. Our community of volunteers and partners deliver a range of programs including seminars, parenting education, playgroups and new parents groups, as well as social gatherings for community and cultural events.

We are a voice for LGBTQ+ parents and their children, providing advocacy, support and opportunities to celebrate our families. We are governed by a Board of Directors and supported by volunteer committees comprised of professionals and experienced advocates.

As a charity, registered with the ACNC, Rainbow Families works to reduce discrimination and disadvantage faced by children of LGBTQ+ parents so they can thrive and shine, and is a support network for parents and carers, as well as future parents and carers.

As a not-for-profit organisation, we rely on fundraising, community grants, and private donations to ensure our quality programs continue. We were first convened in early 2015, and incorporated in April 2016. In 2020 Rainbow Families became a registered charity under Commonwealth law and we continue to develop our welfare division to further assist those in need.

# EXECUTIVE OFFICER REPORT

#### Howdy, for one last time...

For those who don't know me, my name is Scott Brunelle. I was one of the two founding CoChairs of Rainbow Families back in 2015 and have been currently serving as CoChair for the past three years. While it is bittersweet, I will be finishing up my time on the board at the 2022 AGM. I am excited to be making room for new leadership to support the continued delivery of our charitable purpose and to continue developing Rainbow Families as an organisation.

Looking back to 2015, when a few of us LGBTQ+ parents with children first met as a diverse group, and decided to come together to form Rainbow Families, it is hard to believe how far we have come. Today, Rainbow Families is a thriving charity with a huge purpose: To reduce the suffering and disadvantage faced by the children of LGBTQ+ parents.

As an organisation, we work toward achieving our purpose in two ways. Firstly, we work from the inside to support and build up our amazing community of children and families. Secondly, we work from the outside to reduce the suffering and disadvantage faced by our children and families when we intersect with the wider, non-LGBTQ+ community. I am proud to say that during 2022, we made substantial progress in both areas.

To support our community, in addition to all of the community events and programs that were already in existence, 2022 saw the launch of the Peer Support Program. This pivotal program was launched to ensure that no LGBTQ+ parent or family feels alone, no matter where they are geographically or in their parenting journey. 2022 also saw more amazing work from the Youth Advisory Council as they developed and launched a dedicated resource that shares the voice of young people with LGBTQ+ parents. This resource brings to life our young people's experiences as it shares the stories and interests of some young people in our community. Congratulations to all members of the YAC and everyone else who helped bring this resource to life.

As we look at how Rainbow Families works to reduce the suffering and disadvantage faced by our children and families, we are proud of the continued work Rainbow Families has completed with the Strong, Safe and Fabulous initiative. In particular, the multiple webinar series that were run in 2022 to help educators of all ages learn more about how to be inclusive of our children and families.

2022 also saw the kick-off of an ongoing relationship with Early Childhood Australia (ECA). ECA is the peak body representing 0-5 educators Australia-wide. Our work with them is focused on helping all early childhood educators become confident to intentionally teach all children about family diversity, including LGBTQ+ parents. Unfortunately, research tells us that most children in Australia with LGBTQ+ parents will experience some form of abuse or discrimination at some point based on their family. But by educating all children Australia-wide on family diversity, our children will likely experience less discrimination and disadvantage as they grow. It is a big task to educate all children in Australia on family diversity, but a very worthwhile goal that will support our children for generations to come.

As writing this is my last official action as CoChair, I want to say thank to our community for allowing me to serve. Thank you to Kylie Gwynne, Charlie Willbridge, Vanessa Gonzalez, and Justine Maguire-Scarvelli for being CoChairs with me through the years. Thank you to our Executive Officer Ashley Scott for your dedication and passion to keeping Rainbow Families moving forward, and last but not least, a huge thank you to my fellow board and committee members, past and present, and all our amazing volunteers. It is through a collective effort that all things are possible.

We hope you enjoy reading all that Rainbow Families has been up to in the past year, and thank you in advance for your continued support.



### **Playgroups**

Our weekly playgroup in Erskineville and our monthly playgroup in Currans Hill are wonderful places for new parents to meet, and babies and toddlers experience social connection and play. Thank you to Stacey Barnes in Erskineville and Havley Todd in Currans Hill who coordinate playgroup and welcome new families.

### **Antenatal Class**

In partnership with Sydney Local Health District, the Rainbow Families Antenatal and postnatal class runs every quarter. The Rainbow Families antenatal class is an LGTBQ+ focused, inclusive, parenting education class. The first half of the day is dedicated to the birth process and is aimed at people who will be in the birth suite. After lunch the class opens up to all expectant parents and carers, with important information on postnatal care, and what to do when you get home with your baby.

### **Lactation Resource**

In partnership with the Australian Breastfeeding Association, the Rainbow Families lactation class is run three times each year and is an inclusive parent education class for LGBTQ+ parents wanting to understand the options for breastfeeding, chestfeeding, co-feeding and so much more.

This well attended and popular group is designed to support LGBTQ+ parents with new babies. Facilitated by Jo Fletcher from Connect Redfern the group runs like a traditional new parents group for the first four weeks with education and information for new parents. The group then continues to meet for the rest of the term as a supported baby group for queer parents.







### **Mardi Gras**

The Rainbow Families Mardi Gras volunteer committee worked many hours liaising with event organisers, developing float costumes and themes, organising props and banners. Bern and the team did an excellent job. The result was slick, colourful and gorgeous. We could not put on all of the events throughout the year without our wonderful team of volunteers.

For those marching with Rainbow Families at Mardi Gras, it was a fabulous evening! The marshalling area was full of entertainment. The kids had a ball watching the other floats practice their dance moves, and the sense of community was amazing. Once we started marching, the kids didn't know where to look. A stadium full of people cheering them on made it a night they will remember forever.



### **Family Pride**

We were excited to celebrate International Family Equality Day with other LGBTQ+ families organisations from around the world. The Family Fun Day was held in Marrickville, and included performances, a visit from Wild Life Sydney Zoo who came with reptiles, snakes and a cuddly koala, Madame Tussaud brought Troye Sivan along for the day. Reverse Garbage ran one of their fabulous craft activities for kids. Drag Storytime with Joyce Maynge was a hit. Thanks to ACON, Wear It Purple, The Gender Centre, Anti-Discrimination NSW, Barnardos, IVF Australia, Cannon and Twenty10 for hosting activities for children and young people. Thank you also to Commonwealth Bank for funding this event.

### **Halloween Disco**

After a three year break we were so excited to have our Halloween Disco back on this year. The disco was an opportunity for families for families from around Sydney to come together and be with our amazing community and engage with some very exciting activities as well as get dressed up in some incredible costumes. Thank you to Macquarie Bank for funding this event and making it free for our community to attend.

### **Resilience Camp**

Our annual Resilience Camp ran again this year at the Academy of Sport, Narrabeen, with 100 people participating from across NSW. This year was the fourth time this camp has been run and it has become evident that this camp is of vital importance to our community, especially those living in regional NSW. A huge thank you to our Resilience Camp organising committee who are also parent volunteers from our community - Sarah, Emma, Georgia, Vanessa, Teirnay, Skye and Emma, and Bridget.

# Making Rainbow Families

We know LGBTQ+ families are created in such diverse ways. Making Rainbow Families is our annual event that helps to connect and support prospective parents. This year the event was offered using the "hybrid model" of face-to-face and online. This was the first time this format was used and it proved to be supportive as we had participants join who couldn't make it in person. The one day event was very successful with over 80 people attending (half in-person and half virtual) from across Australia.

Special thanks to the following organisations and individuals who presented: Jacqueline MacDiarmid, Barnados Australia, IVF Australia, Growing Families, Surrogacy Australia and KMJ Family Law. A huge thank you to our volunteers, Scott Brunelle (who coordinated the event), and Kylie Gwen, Marly Greenwood and Bridget Muir who volunteered on the day.

# Strong Safe Fabulous

#StrongSafeFabulous is community education project developed by Prosper (Project Australia) in partnership with Rainbow Families to support the prevention of domestic and family violence, and child abuse in LGBTIQA+ families.

The project has developed a range of resources for parents, resources for children and teenagers, and a website to host all of these resources. #StrongSafeFabulous is informed by Our Watch's Change the Story, the Australian national prevention of violence against women framework and Rainbow Health Victoria's Pride In Prevention.

The focus of the project this year has been on educating schools and educators around LGBTIQA+ inclusion. We've run monthly webinars aimed at school staff covering topics such as How Religious Schools Can Be Inclusive Of LGBTIQA+ Students, Fostering Inclusive Attitudes In Primary School Children and Creating Allies And Connection In Young People.





### Neurodiverse Rainbow Families Group

Virtually, we also established a Facebook group for Neurodivergent Families which is admin'd by volunteer parents with lived experience. This group has grown fast and we can see there is a need for supporting neurodivergent families. Big thanks to Justine, Jolene and Bridget who look after this group.

### LGBTQ+ Inclusive Training For Midwives

Some LGBTQ+ families also require non judgemental support from midwives and birthing support people. As such, this year Rainbow Families also partnered with the Australia College of Midwives to create a LGBTQ+ inclusive training package for midwives. A fabulous step towards more inclusive care. Thank you to Rachel Reid and Bridget Muir for working on this project.





### **Youth Council**

The Youth Advisory Council (YAC) has had a momentous year with their amazing new resource, "Little Rainbows", which is a resource developed for young people by young people. Rainbow Families also have employed a youth worker, Mon Enriquez, to support the Youth Advisory Council moving forward. A very special thank you to Vanessa Gonzalez who has given so much ongoing support, time and love to the YAC, and to Amand Third and the team at The Young And Resilient Research Centre at Western Sydney University for their work on Little Rainbows.

# Family Diversity Training For Early Learning Educators

As children grow and start moving into early education settings, many LGBTQ+ parents have found that there is a lack of understanding of what it means to be an LGBTQ+ parent or carer. Because of this huge gap, Early Education Australia and Rainbow Families now have a partnership to develop and establish a "Family Diversity" training module and package for early childhood educators in Australia. This groundbreaking project has been led by Scott Brunelle and Marly Greenwood, who also travelled to Canberra to present at the Early Childhood Australia National Conference. This project will soon be launched and early childhood educators will be able to access the training package online.

### **COVID Packs**

Earlier this year was challenging for many families due to ongoing COVID restrictions, isolation periods, and the impact on ability to connect with family, friends and community. Many families reached out to us looking for information, support, and referrals.

To help support our community we partnered with Reverse Garbage to create and deliver sustainable activity packs for children in Rainbow Families. The wonderful team at Reverse Garbage use repurposed, up-cycled materials to create a number of different child led art and craft activities that with limited supervision children will be able to do, and also provide parents some much needed support.

The project was funded by the Department of Communities and Justice, and focused on supporting families to balance caring for their kids while juggling working and life during the pandemic.

# Parenting Teens Webinar Series

A gap recognised earlier this year was the lack of support for LGBTQ+ parents and carers with teenagers. As such, MetroAisst with support from Rainbow Families also ran a series of webinars for LGBTQ+ parents and carers of teenagers. These webinars ran once per month via live Zoom and are available on our website for access.

### Peer Support Program

This year we also continued the Peer Support Program that started at the end of 2021. Overall, we have had two rounds of the program and participants have found it beneficial connecting with another LGBTQ+parent from the community. These have been coordinated by our Peer Support Program Coordinator, Monique Rebeiro.

# **EQUALITY**

2022 was a busy and productive year for our equality team. The nature of fighting for equality for our families is that a lot of the work we do is reactive to situations that arise throughout the year. This year the issues we responded to were the lack of inclusion of our families in the Census and the opportunity to have our families included in Alex Greengich's Equality Bill.

## **Legal Parentage**

Our legal parentage campaign has continued to try and deliver on reforms to laws Australia. We want to ensure families are protected by the law and find a clearer pathway to making families through surrogacy arrangements in an ethical way. We have created a coalition of organisations and individuals with an interest in this issue and are working with Equality Australia to continue to push for recognition of parentage for our families.

### Census

It was disappointing to see that the Census 2021 did not collect data about our families in an inclusive way, nor was it effective in providing an accurate snapshot of Australian society. The information collected by the Census helps government, non-government organisations and businesses to provide of a range of services across the community. We have met with the Australian Bureau of Statistics a number of times this year voicing our concerns about the way in which the questions were written and how we were not captured. We will continue to advocate to ensure our communities are accurately recorded in the Census.

### **GOVERNANCE**

Rainbow families is registered with the Australian Charities Not-for-Profits Commission (ACNC). This has been the third year Rainbow Families have been operating under its Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) which requires adhering to ACNC standards.

Last year we built on our Governance foundation and continued to focus on programs and events and the governance of the organisation itself including operational aspects and board functions.

In late 2022 the board established a Governance Committee. The Governance committee wasted no time in commenced its work. An ACNC self-assessment has been undertaken to understand the existing governance arrangements, from this established a program of works to be undertaken over the next 12 months. A review of policies and establishing an appropriate risk management framework are part of this program of work.

### **MARKETING**

The role of the marketing committee is to amplify our messages, connect with families and allies and entice participation in the broader conversation about Rainbow Families.

This year we were building on the base we developed in 2021 with the refresh of our marketing strategy, new website build and relaunch of our Instagram and Tick Tock sites.

Our committee met monthly to ensure that we were delivering our strategy and to hear updates from our key team members who have responsibilities in the areas of the newsletter, social media, website and supporting key events and activities such as Mardi Gras, Resilience Camp, Fair Day to name a few.

### **Social Media**

Facebook & Instagram are our primary channels to connect with our key audiences, which has increased significantly over the last 12 months – 63% increase in followers to facebook and 17% on Instagram.

### Website

The committee has continued to improve the website to ensure that it becomes the key hub and resource centre for RF, with the analytics confirming that viewers are increasing the time spent on key pages and not bouncing out of the site at the home page.

The final months of 2022 has been focussing our attention on ensuring that we have a strong, vibrant and fun presence at World Pride in March 23, with key activities such as the Human Rights Conference, Drag Story time at the Aquarium, Making Rainbow Families seminar and our annual fair day and parade experiences.
