

Last week's Senate session hit with a one-two punch to our communities. We once again had a chance to codify Roe into law, with HB 88 making its way to the Senate floor. The Senate version of the bill failed earlier this session but this bill had made its way out of the GOP-led House. But yet again, my Republican colleagues chose to vote it down. They seem to not understand the urgency, even on the heels of the Texas ruling that threatens access to an important form of reproductive care.

And last week, we learned that a 25-year old New Hampshire man posted a credible threat to "shoot up" Portsmouth High School. Sen Altschiller and I stood on the Senate floor to acknowledge his apprehension. It's our duty as elected officials to do everything we can to stop gun violence and protect our children. Earlier this session, we passed SB 244, which would intensify the punishment for acts of terrorism like this one. It's imperative that the House agrees and sends this bill to the Governor's desk.

Gun violence continues to be a pressing issue in the nation. Just in the past 95 days, there have been 128 mass shootings, the majority of them being on school grounds. Delaney Nadeau (Oyster River '24) helped lead a walkout to end gun violence on April 5, 2023.

We must address this issue to ensure the safety of our fellow students. School should be a place where students go to learn, not to worry about your safety. Thank you so much Delaney Nadeau and all of our Seacoast members who are active on this issue for your work.

The Budget is here!

Everything You Need To Know About NH Budget for Fiscal Years 2024-2025:

Last Thursday, the House passed a proposed \$15.9 billion budget for the fiscal years 2024 and 2025 on a voice vote that is now headed to the Senate. Once the Senate has passed its version of the budget, the House has the option of "concurring" (agreeing) with the Senate's changes, or requesting a Committee of Conference to hammer out their differences. If both the bodies agree on a final version, then it will head to the governor for signature or veto.

The House budget is separated into three different bills: HB 1, the operational budget, which funds state agencies and departments; HB 2, The "trailer bill", which includes additional appropriations and policy changes; and HB 25, the capital budget, which covers infrastructure.

Key Takeaways

(based on the "As Amended by the House" versions of HB 1 and HB 2 of which are subject to change throughout the budget process in the Senate)

The Good:

- Appropriates \$30 million in affordable housing funding
- Expands Medicaid postpartum coverage to 12 months

- additional spending.
- Ensuring that schools with low-income students are prioritized in the education funding formula.
- Strikes down the expansion of the education freedom account, and reduces the annual appropriation for EFAs down to \$20 million
- A 10% wage increase for state employees survived

The Not So Good:

- The passage of an accelerated phase out of the Interest & Dividends tax to the benefit of only the most well-off in our state
- Moves school building aid, special education aid, and other public school funding from the Education Trust Fund to the General Fund.
- \$20 million increase in school building aid failed, and removed \$75 million appropriated for school building aid
- Legalizing cannabis failed to be included in HB2

I look forward to working with my Senate colleagues to keep key priorities like funding for affordable housing and postpartum support in the budget, two key priorities that I've led this session and that have seen overwhelming bipartisan support!

MomsCaucus Brunch







The NH Department of Energy recently announced the release of \$8.8 million EECBG grants for cities and counties

that were previously ineligible for these funds. EECBG grants can be used for a wide variety of projects that lower energy costs, reduce carbon emissions, or improve energy efficiency.
