[Detroit Institute of Arts](#)

The Detroit Institute of Arts houses a world-class, encyclopedic collection of 65,000 artworks, ranging from ancient Egyptian treasures to contemporary masterpieces, spread across more than 100 galleries inside a historic white marble landmark.

[Campus Martius Park](#)

Named the nation's top public square by *USA Today*, this bustling 1.2-acre downtown plaza marks Detroit's zero-mile point of origin and features live performance stages, historic monuments, and a shop selling locally designed apparel.

[Detroit Riverwalk](#)

Voted the nation's best riverwalk by *USA Today*, this scenic five-mile waterfront path stretches from Belle Isle toward Michigan Central, offering a continuous, car-free route for walkers, bikers, and skaters to explore connected riverside parks and greenways.

Operating as one of America's oldest public markets, this bustling neighborhood hub invites visitors to shop for fresh produce, flowers, and local artisan crafts inside historic open-air sheds surrounded by blocks of vibrant street murals.

[Comerica Park \(Detroit Tigers\)](#)

Home to the city's Major League baseball team, this downtown stadium pairs unobstructed skyline views with amusement park-style entertainment, featuring a tiger-themed carousel, a Ferris wheel, and a walkable baseball history museum.

Belle Isle Aquarium

The Belle Isle Aquarium Houses more than 200 aquatic species beneath a stunning arched ceiling lined with green glass tiles to evoke an immersive underwater feeling.

Dossin Great Lakes Museum (located on Belle Isle)

The Dossin Great Lakes Museum showcases the rich maritime history of the Great Lakes with captivating exhibits, immersive displays, and educational experiences that highlight the region's shipping heritage, culture, and historic vessels.

Ford House

The Ford House is an 87-acre lakeside estate from 1928 that features the ivy-covered mansion of Eleanor and Edsel Ford, sweeping manicured gardens along Lake St. Clair, and a modern visitor center offering guided home tours and exhibitions.

Ford Rouge Factory Tour

This immersive experience inside a real, working automotive plant allows visitors to walk along an elevated, self-paced walkway to watch vehicles being built on the active assembly line, alongside historic vehicle displays and an observation deck with a massive living roof.

Motown Museum

This legendary music landmark allows fans to step inside the original "Hitsville U.S.A." recording studio where timeless tracks were recorded, exploring a rich collection of authentic stage costumes, vintage equipment, and the restored flat of founder Berry Gordy.

Midtown

This thriving cultural hub just north of downtown combines legendary institutions like the Detroit Institute of Arts and the Charles H. Wright Museum of African American History with a vibrant mix of independent shops, historic theaters, and the high-energy entertainment of Little Caesars Arena.

Corktown

As the city's oldest existing neighborhood, this historic enclave pairs 19th-century Victorian townhouses and iconic red-brick streets with a booming modern scene of trendy restaurants and the beautifully restored Michigan.
