# Progress is being made toward an American River Flow Standard by Felix Smith

On September 8, 2005 the Bureau of Reclamation agreed to support the Water Forum's flow regime. The intent of a Water Forum flow regime is to keep fish resources and other aquatic life in "good condition" per Fish and Game Code Section 5937.

The California Department of Fish and Game, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the National Marine Fisheries Service (NOAA Fisheries) have agreed to support the Water Forum's flow regime for the Lower American River.

The regulatory minimum flow regime is approximately 800 to 1750 cfs with Chinook salmon spawning conditions about 2,000 cfs or more in many years depending on ARB hydrology, upstream storage and CVP storage. A temperature component is also a part of the flow regime to protect summering over steelhead and to provide water temperature protective of holding adult Chinook salmon and to provide water temperature for spawning and egg incubation.

Summer and early fall water temperatures should be less than 65 F degrees with water temperatures of 58 to 60 F degrees during the Chinook salmon and steelhead spawning, egg incubation and rearing.

This flow regime is an important tool in protecting the fish resources and aquatic habitats of the Lower American River. SARA has been in the forefront in fighting for a flow standard that is protective of the Chinook salmon and steelhead resources of the American River. The Bureau of Reclamation operates Folsom / Nimbus Dams and Reservoirs for multiple purposes including water for irrigation, municipal and industrial uses, hydroelectric power, recreation, water quality, and flood control and fish protection. The Folsom / Nimbus project is operated under a State Water Resources Control Board permit issued in 1958 called Decision 893. The Flow Management Standard when approved by the State Water Resources Control Board will become a condition of the Bureau of Reclamation's water right permit for the operation of the Folsom / Nimbus Dams and Reservoir projects.

Still to be agreed upon is a team of players on the River Management Group and its role in managing the American River as an integral part of the Central Valley riverine system, agreement with upstream water right holders and a monitoring program must be formulated. Also the Bureau of Reclamation is to formulate an Annual Operations Plan by May 1 of each year, which will describe how Folsom Project operations will achieve the flow and temperature prescriptions for the various flow regimes. Surface Water Resources, Inc., fishery consultants to the Water Forum have contributed greatly to the development of the Flow Management Standard for the Lower American River.

#### THANK YOU TO PARKWAY SUPPORTERS

The Sacramento County Board of Supervisors agreed to add \$450,000. to the 2005-2006 American River Parkway Budget. 2005-2006 Parkway funding had been originally set at \$3,127,000. or less than 2/10th of 1% of the total County Budget. The proposed amount was actually 20% less than the Parkway funding level of 5 years earlier, and only 39% of the amount the County commissioned Dangermond Study stated was the appropriate amount to properly secure and maintain the Parkway.

Thank you to so many of you who took the time to send letters and e-mails to the Board of Supervisors, to voice your support for the Parkway. The appearance by Parkway advocates before the Board, and especially communications from the community – *your communications* – made the difference.

More funds would have been better but considering that the supervisors enhanced only a few County agency budgets—primarily law enforcement agencies - Parkway advocates are grateful for the increase which will allow for the additional rangers and more adequate maintenance of this community treasure.

Thank you one and all. I know that many of you pass on these Parkway alerts to other individuals and groups. Thank you for doing so.

## The Parkway is truly the community's to save or lose.

As one of many who have spent hundreds of hours on various Parkway issues, as well as hundreds of hours attending meetings and events working to restore the American River's fisheries, this decision by the Board is a huge victory for supporters of the Parkway!

If we fail to save the wetlands, we will be losing more than an economic and aesthetic asset that never be recreated. The loss may also signal an impending and crushing defeat in the larger effort to maintain an environment that civilized man can inhabit.

#### WATER FORUM WORKING TO STRENGTHEN CONSERVATION PLANS

One of the key elements of the Water Forum Agreement (WFA), signed by SARA and other stakeholders in 2000, is water conservation. By agreeing to implement water conservation plans, water purveyors in the Sacramento region can help meet water supply needs and minimize need for increased groundwater use and surface water diversions from the American River.

To satisfy the water conservation element of the WFA, water purveyors negotiated specific water conservation plans based upon established Best Management Practices (BMPs).

Two important elements of these plans are water meter retrofits and conservation pricing. Implementation of these BMPs allows water users to know how much water they are using and receive accurate data to encourage the most economical use of water.

The rate of residential meter retrofits depends upon each purveyor's plan. For their non-residential customers, purveyors agreed to retrofit 85 to 90 percent within ten years. As of 2004, 11 of 15 reporting agencies had completed their non-residential meter retrofit programs and the others were making progress in their programs.

Implementation of several other BMPs has been disappointing, including interior and exterior water audits and toilet replacement programs. Often the retrofits, such as installation of a water efficient toilet, can trigger more expensive requirements, such as building permits or compliance with other laws.

It is estimated that landscape water use accounts for 50 percent of the water used by residential customers in California. Water Forum purveyors agreed to certain actions aimed at reducing landscape water use by their customers.

In 2004 the Water Forum convened a task force made up of Forum stakeholders, city and county planning agency personnel and members of the landscape industry to examine the implementation of more stringent landscape ordinances in the Sacramento region.

The task force developed a draft list of recommendations to strengthen requirements and implementation of local ordinances. These will be reviewed (and hopefully adopted and enforced) by the Water Forum and local agencies in the coming months.

Also last year, WF staff and stakeholders began the process of updating water conservation plans with each water purveyor, as called for in the WFA.

The goal of the update process is to help purveyors design conservation programs that are more suitable to their needs, based on their experiences during the ramp-up period, while continuing to achieve the conservation goals originally established in the WFA.

#### PARKWAY COALITION - 3 BOARD MEETING

The American River Parkway Coalition, created in early 2004, is an alliance of the three original and historic Parkway protection and preservation organizations: Save the American River Association (SARA); the American River Natural History Association (ARNHA), and the American River Parkway Foundation (ARFP).

Each member organization has its own unique personality and mission, yet by combining diverse backgrounds, interests and resources, the resulting synergy has generated new energy and events designed to bring positive attention to –and support for – the *American River Parkway*.

The Coalition has already: \* held two successful PDA Days (Public Display of Affection) at several locations along the Parkway; \* sponsored the **2005** *Parkway Stakeholder Summit* that attracted and informed over 150 user organization and government leaders; \* met with each County supervisor and attended County budget hearings – activities which definitely contributed to the decision to fund the Parkway for 2004-05.

In addition, Coalition members were very active in the development of the 1<sup>st</sup> annual *Parkway Pass Promotion* and honored a consistent Parkway supporter on *Illa Collin Day* last December.

All of this has been accomplished by a small group of individuals from the 3 organizations. Coalition members feel it is now time to bring the boards of the 3 organizations together at one time and place – to update everyone on the activities, accomplishments and goals of the Coalition.

A Coalition representative from each organization will briefly review the mission and goals of their respective organization, and the Coalition vision of what needs to be done in the future will be presented. A feedback session will follow the presentations. A get-to-know each other party will follow the business portion.

The first-ever 3 Board Meeting will be held the evening of Friday, October 14<sup>th</sup>, graciously hosted by ARPF Board Member Scott Wolcott, at his home on the American River. Formal invitations will be sent to current board members of the 3 Coalition organizations.

# UPDATING OF THE 1985 AMERICAN RIVER PARKWAY PLAN

The Sacramento Board of Supervisors and the Sacramento City Council jointly initiated in April 2003 the update of the 1985 American River Parkway Plan. To accomplish this task, the Update Citizens Advisory Committee was formed.

The Update Committee consists of twenty-three persons who serve as representatives of the Board of Supervisors, the Sacramento City Council, environmental organizations, and clubs representing Parkway users. The Update Committee is assisted and guided by project Staff, facilitators and consultants. Also assisting is a Project Management Team comprised of staff from local, state and federal agencies with Parkway responsibilities or involvement.

The role of the Update Committee is to work to reach maximum agreement on advisory recommendations to the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors and the Sacramento City Council for update of the 1985 Parkway Plan. The Update Committee meets on a monthly schedule.

The spring and summer of 2005 was used to review the lower reach of the Parkway consisting of Discovery Park, Woodlake and Cal Expo areas, referred to as the Integrated Plan Areas. Starting in September 2005 the remainder of the Parkway will be studied so that the Update Committee can make additional recommendations.

## **NEW LOCAL HISTORY FOCUSES ON PARKWAY** by Peter Hayes

The Lower American River: Prehistory to Parkway, just published by the American River Natural History Association (ARNHA), is an updated and renovated edition of its earlier *History of the Lower American River*. The new title points up the fresh emphasis on latter-day issues threatening the quality of the Sacramento region's premier natural treasure.

The profusely illustrated volume, edited by Peter J. Hayes, follows the footsteps of the native Nisenan who were nurtured by the River's bountiful salmon fishers, Jedediah Smith's "reckless breed" of beaver trappers, empire builder John Augustus Sutter, the gold-seekers and the entrepreneurs down to today's dedicated citizens who fight to protect the 31½ mile long preserve and the river it embraces.

It updates ongoing efforts to win greater county funding for parkway ranger patrols, maintenance and education at the Effie Yeaw Nature Center; increased minimum river flows to protect the fishery, and strict enforcement of zoning laws to block development that would intrude on the Parkway.

The new edition contains 57 vintage drawings and modern photographs, a tri-fold pull-out historical map and timeline, and a comprehensive index. The volume was originally published in 1977 with a grant from the Natomas Company to Sacramento County, which contracted with the City of Sacramento Museum and History Division to do the job under the supervision of James Henley. It was edited by Lucinda Woodward and Jesse M. Smith. In 1991, editor William Dillinger updated it for ARNHA.

This new edition is another in a series of publications by the Carmichael-based American River Natural History Association, a non-profit organization guided by a commitment to "bringing people to nature and nature to people." Other volumes in print include *The Outdoor World of the Sacramento Region*, a local field guide; *Biking and Hiking the American River Parkway*, and the *American River Almanac Reflection on Nature throughout the Year.* 

Priced at \$14.95, the new history edition is available at the Effie Yeaw Nature Center in Ancil Hoffman Park, Carmichael, and selected book stores.

## NIBBLING AWAY AT THE PARKWAY PLAN Alan Wade, President

SARA hired attorney Keith Wagner of the Wm. Yeates law firm, to write a letter to the Rancho Cordova City Council, urging the latter to drop their plan to use Parkway land as a launching pad for Fourth of July fireworks.

The Parkway Plan, which is the law protecting the Parkway, is very clear in the prohibition of fireworks. The Board of Supervisors took action in a special session on Monday, June 27. SARA's attorney testified, along with SARA board members. Faced with legal action instigated by SARA, and unanimous objections of the Board of Supervisors, Rancho Cordova reluctantly backed off.

The lesson learned? There is no end to the struggle to retain respect for the Parkway as a nature preserve, and direct action by SARA and others who care will become more and more important in the future. Can the Parkway continue as a nature preserve and open space area into the foreseeable future? Powerful forces view the Parkway as fair game for development. The only counter force is SARA and those who join us in fighting back every effort to encroach on the Parkway.
