Guru Nanak's Core Teachings

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
Guru Nanak Dev Ji's philosophy is based on three pillars:

প্তি Naam Japna (chanting God's name)

প্তি Kirat Karni (earning an honest living)

প্তি Vand Chakna (sharing with others)

Gender Equality
