Gender Equity. What do the survey results tell us?

This interactive workshop will grapple with the results of the recent survey Gender Equity in Jewish community organisations in NSW. Rebecca Forgasz, the lead researcher of this survey, will share some key insights and then give participants an opportunity to discuss the data and share some of their own experiences.

This survey, which is a first of its kind in our community, received over 240 responses from a wide range of community members. The results provide crucial data to underpin our discussions about how we move forward.

Anna Green

Anna is a Managing Director and Senior Partner at the Boston Consulting Group, leading BCG's Asia-Pacific People function. Anna has published several research reports on gender diversity and actions needed, with a focus on corporate leadership.

Anna was previously a member of JCA's Allocation committee (2015-2018) and is a member of Chief Executive Women.



Amanda Bowman LONDON

Amanda chairs the Defence Division of the Board of Deputies, that focuses on the defence of Jewish freedoms, rights and security, specifically all forms of antisemitism, racism,anti-Israel extremism and bigotry.

As a Deputy for The Hampstead Synagogue since 2012, she was Chair of BODSA (the Board's Social Action Group) and its first Gender Equality Champion before being elected Vice President.



Courtney Winter-Peters

Courtney is Stand Up's CEO with a passion for social justice and the Jewish community.

A former lawyer with experience in Senior Leadership roles in the community legal sector, Courtney is committed to advocating for systemic change and empowering vulnerable and disadvantaged people.



Dawn Waterman LONDON

Dawn Waterman is Director of Education and Community Engagement at the Board of Deputies and a member of the Board's Senior Management Team.

An activist in the Union of Jewish Students, Dawn began her career as parliamentary research assistant to Greville Janner MP with whom she worked on the successful introduction of legislation to enable the prosecution of Nazi war criminals who had entered Britain.



Donna Jacobs Sife

Donna is an award-winning storyteller, educator and writer. She has been involved with Judaism as a teacher, performer, writer and contemporary interpreter.

Donna is a co-founder of Jewish Voices for Peace and Justicte, and was the Program Director of Together For Humanity, an interfaith educational organisation.



Elana Benjamin

Elana is an Australian-Jewish writer of Indian-Iraqi heritage. Her work has been published in Good Weekend, Sunday Life, The Sydney Morning Herald, SBS Voices, Essential Kids, ReachOut.com and the Jewish Book Council blog.

She is also the author of My Mother's Spice Cupboard: A Journey from Baghdad to Bombay to Bondi (Hybrid Publishers, 2012).



Genevieve Abbey

Genevieve is a senior manager at Accenture with extensive experience assisting government and private organisations through digital enablement and digital transformation.

She currently leads the Accenture Development Partnerships, Health group and is committed to designing solutions that help create a fairer and more equitable society.



Rebecca Forgasz

Rebecca was Director & CEO of the Jewish Museum of Australia, and an Associate Professor (Practice) at Monash University in the Australian Centre for Jewish Civilisation and the Monash Intercultural Lab.

She is currently on the board of the National Council of Jewish Women of Australia (Victoria) and the Jewish Climate Network, which she co-founded in 2019.



Yvonne Weldon

Yvonne is a proud Wiradjuri woman and the Deputy Chairperson of the Metropolitan Local Aboriginal Land Council. She also serves as an independent councillor for the City of Sydney and is the first Aboriginal councillor in the City's 180-year history.

A life-long activist, Yvonne has 30 years' experience driving positive reform in health, education and child protection. She recently published a novel, Sixty-Seven Days.



Lisa Ezekiel

Lisa has served as Head Community Relations & Fundraising at Community Security Group (CSG) and was a founding board member of the Jewish Professional Women's Network.

Working at NCJWA Vic allows Lisa to combine two of her greatest passions: the Jewish community and equity for women.



Marie Van Der Zyl LONDON

She became a Deputy in 2012 and was elected Vice President in 2015. She played a crucial part in the fight against antisemitism in the Labour Party.

Marie was at the forefront of the campaign against the so-called "cab- rank" policy, by which the Inner North London Coroner delayed the release of bodies to Jewish families. The High Court ruled that this policy was discriminatory. Her negotiations with King's College London resulted in its adoption of the internationally recognised IHRA definition of antisemitism and she has energetically pursued interfaith relations with Britain's faith communities.



Nomi Kaltmann

Nomi is one of the founding members of the Women's Orthodox Tefillah Group in Victoria. She is also the founder and inaugural president of the Jewish Orthodox Feminist Alliance (JOFA) in Australia.

Her work promoting gender equality for Australian women has been covered in major Australian newspapers. Nomi is the Australian correspondent at Tablet Magazine.

Rabbanit Judith Levitan

Judith is a community educator and lawyer in the field of social justice. She currently works at Legal Aid NSW and as the Religious Program Coordinator at Maroubra Synagogue.

She was a founding member of the Jewish Alliance Against Family Violence and is a member of the Board of Directors of the National Council of Jewish Women Australia.

She has recently been appointed a chaplain in the Australian Defence Force.



Rabbi Jacqueline Ninio

Rabbi Jacqueline was ordained as a rabbi in 1998. She began her work at Emanuel Synagogue in Sydney, Australia that year.

Rabbi Ninio was the first female rabbi at Emanuel Synagogue and the third Australian born woman to be ordained as a rabbi.

She is an active leader in the Synagogue's social justice programmes and is committed to the pursuit of tikun olam, working to heal the world through deeds and actions.



Rabbi Alon Meltzer

Rabbi Alon Meltzer is the Director of Programs at Shalom and the Rabbi of Or Chadash Synagogue.

Originally from Auckland, New Zealand, he has both MAs in Sociology as well as Medieval Jewish History, he received ordination from Yeshiva University is pursuing a PhD at LaTrobe University.

He is a staunch Orthodox Feminist, and believes in furthering the democratisation and accessibility to Jewish knowledge to all areas of Jewish peoplehood.



Rachel Marie

Rachel is a communications professional from Sydney. She is a member of the NSW Jewish Board of Deputies' Social Justice division; Yallah (an organisation for Sephardi and Mizrahi youth); and the Sydney Alliance's Jewish caucus.

As the grandaughter of Holocaust survivors and Mauritian immigrants, Rachel has always been passionate about bridging division between different CALD and faith communities, as well as elevating Jewish voices in multicultural spaces.



Yael Stone

Australian actor Yael Stone is best known for playing Lorna Morello in seven seasons of the multiply-awarded Netflix series, Orange Is the New Black. She's known to Sydney theatregoers for many roles including Diary of a Madman and The Beauty Queen of Leenane. Yael began working on screen in Australia at the age of 12.

Yael has a slew of awards under her belt including Best Newcomer, Best Supporting Actor, 3-time SAG Award winner for Best Ensemble. She is a proud ambassador for AIME, and has written for The Guardian, The Sydney Morning Herald, Elle magazine and Junkee.

In Jan 2020 at the height of the Australian bushfires, Yael announced that she would be abandoning her US Green Card, with major impact on her transatlantic film career, returning home to Australia as a symbol of her commitment to reducing CO2 emissions. Since then Yael founded Hi Neighbour; an organisation that uses solar projects to fund scholarships for local workers training for Technical Low Carbon jobs.

She's currently studying Sustainable Communities at University of Wollongong.



Jillian Segal

Jillian has a legal, corporate and regulatory background. Currently, a Non-Executive Director of the Garvan Institute for Medical Research and Rabo Bank Australia, Chairman General Sir John Monash Foundation, Chairman AICC(NSW), Chairman Independent Parliamentary Expenses Authority (IPEA), Board Member Grattan Institute, a Trustee of The Sydney Opera House.

Previously she has been a non-executive director of the ASX, NAB and UNSW Sydney. Jillian is also the current President of the ECAJ. having served as Deputy President or Secretary over the last 9 years. Other past community roles have included: JCA (1996 – 2012) – a member/Chairman Allocations Committee; a member/Chairman, Planning Committee and now an Honorary Life Governor.

In all her roles she has been a strong supporter of having more women in senior roles and, as a past director of the ASX, she was involved in driving systemic change regarding approaches to diversify within the corporate sector.
