GROCERY SUMMIT PLANNED FOR EARLY FEBRUARY

Our Local Union is planning an industry-wide grocery summit on February 5, 2011 to prepare for upcoming contract negotiations.

In the past, your Union bargained a "master agreement" that maintained working conditions, wages and benefits for all Union members throughout the industry.

The idea behind the summit is to build solidarity and bring the power of a united grocery membership back into the bargaining process. The summit will be the first meeting for members of all the grocery houses to come together and discuss ways to improve communication and

establish partnerships across the industry before bargaining starts in 2011.

The summit will also be an opportunity to meet and exchange ideas with other Teamster leaders in the grocery industry in our area and to identify key topics for contract negotiations. Members from Fred Meyer, SuperValu, Safeway, and Unified Grocers will be in attendance.

"These are tough times and it's critically important that all of us are on the same page and present a united front as we get into

GROCERY SHOPS FORM UNION

Your Local Union is forming steering committees at all of the major grocery warehouses across the industry in our region in order to improve communication during bargaining. Each steering committee will have captains that will be responsible for distributing critical information to teams of ten members.

Of the four major grocery shops in the area, Fred Meyer was the first to organize its steering committees.

"We took the seniority list and divided up the names into teams of 10," said Business Representative Cecil Fouts. "With about 300 members in the unit, we will have 30 captains for our committee."

The first step to establishing a strong steering committee, explained Fouts, is to update members' phone numbers, emails, and mailing addresses. Once members' contact information is current, steering committee captains can distribute

bargaining updates, meeting times and locations, and other information out to their teams, quickly and efficiently.

"The steering committees will help us achieve better communication, better turnout for meetings, and greater member involvement, which in turn will build solidarity and increase our power at the table," said Business Representative John Sceary. "Our solidarity throughout the industry will send a strong message to employers that we are united."

"I signed up to be a steering committee captain because there is so much at stake - everything from our wages, health and welfare, and working conditions," said 23-year SuperValu forklift driver, Mike Lee. "If we're going to get this done right, we need to get involved and for everybody to stick together."

Thank you to the entire group of steering committee captains for assuming this leadership role!

SHOP STEWARDS IN PLACE FOR 2011 BARGAIN

Over the last several weeks, your Local Union has been conducting Shop Steward elections throughout the grocery industry so that we have in place a strong group of experienced Union leaders as bargaining approaches.

Unified Grocers was the first grocery shop to hold elections, which took place in early October, followed by Fred Meyer later in the month.

At SuperValu, elections were held on Monday, November 29, with a total of six members running for three spots; elections took place at Safeway on Wednesday, December 1, throughout the day, swing and graveyard shifts.

The results of all grocery Shop Steward elections are listed in the table to the left.

bargaining," said Teamsters Local 117 Tracey A. Thompson. "Make no mistake – this is going to be a dogfight, and we need to be ready."

Shawn Griffith, a Safeway order selector who attended a Local 117 grocery workshop last summer, stressed the importance of learning more about the bargaining process. "We have a big group of new guys who are still getting educated about why we have a Union and why we have a contract. There are a lot of issues that we are facing and it's important that we get involved."

John Morris, a 31-year Shop Steward at SuperValu sees health care as the number one issue in upcoming contract negotiations. "These companies are going to try to achieve takeaways that dilute our health benefits. We've got to take a stand and let the employer know that

we're willing to fight."

24-year SuperValu forklift driver, Scott Fueston agrees. "Health and welfare will be one of the hottest issues in bargaining. The Union has done a great job estimating our health care expenditures, so that will be a big bargaining chip for us."

Monty Johnson, a 17-year order selector/forklift driver at Supervalu, is concerned about his Union pension. "We've got a great pension now. The more we can work to strengthen it, the better our collective futures will be."

As soon as the Feb. 5 date for the summit approaches, your Union will be sending a turnout message through your Shop Stewards and communication networks.

Your participation in the summit is a critical step to achieving the kind of strong Teamsters contract that the hardworking men and women of the Puget Sound grocery industry deserve.
