# INTRODUCTION

*10 Cents a Meal for Michigan's Kids & Farms (10 Cents a Meal) is a state-funded program that matches what schools and early care and education (ECE) sites spend on Michigan-grown fruits, vegetables, and dry beans with grants of up to 10 cents per meal.*

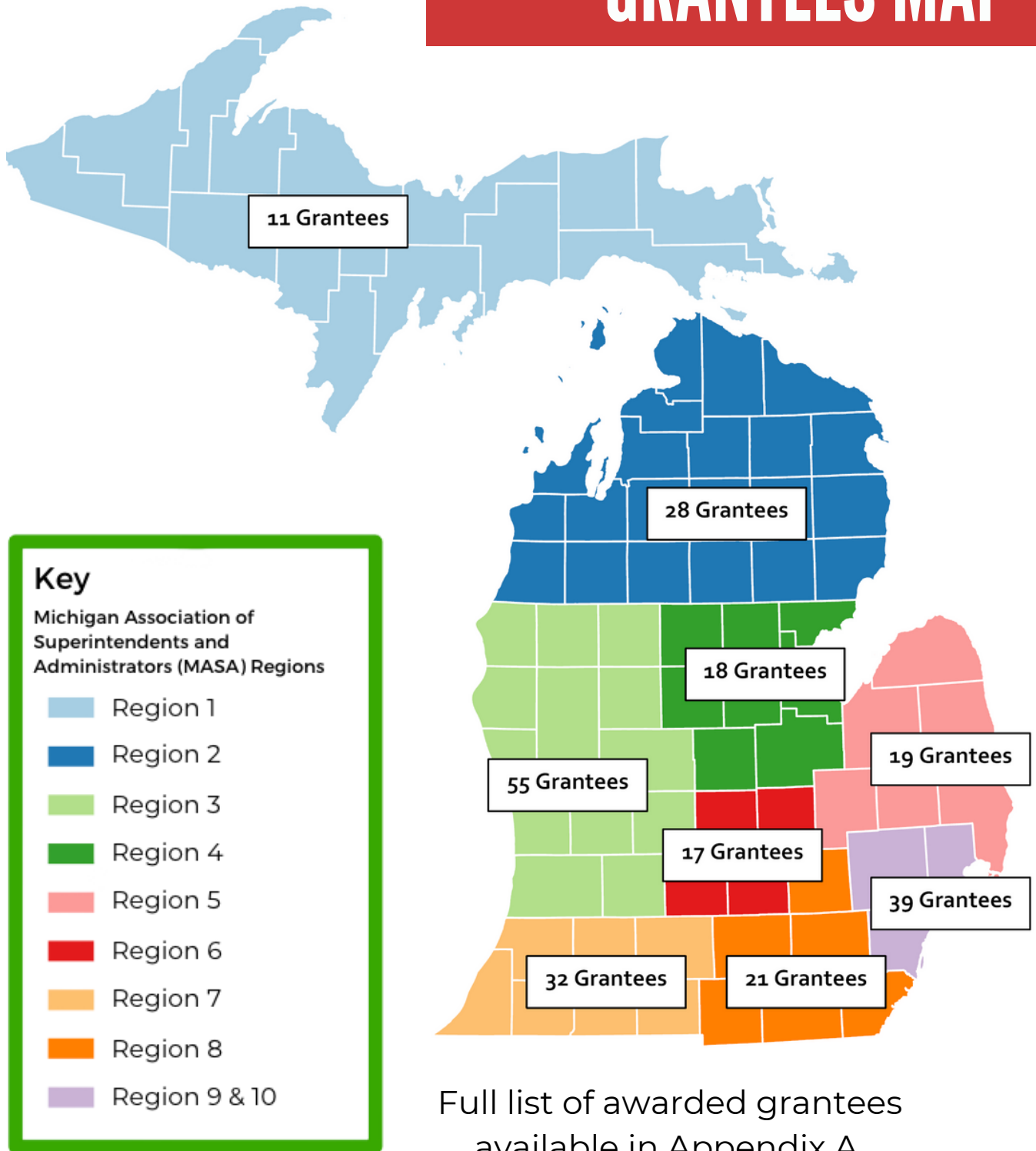
## Program Goals

- Improve daily nutrition and eating habits for children in school and early care and education settings.
- Invest in Michigan agriculture and related local food business economy.

## Program Year Overview

- In the 2022-2023 program, 240 school districts, early care and education sites (ECEs), and other childcare sponsors were awarded over \$5.6 million in funding.
- Throughout the year, 218 different grantees shared information through electronic evaluation surveys (2) and 182 shared purchasing information through invoices.
- Grantees were comprised of 214 public schools and districts, seven non-public schools, two residential child care institutions (RCCIs), 15 ECE sites, and two other non school recipient sponsors (ONSRs) across the state.
- Additionally, 59 childcare centers and family day care home providers participated in 10 Cents a Meal through a pilot program with their Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) sponsoring organization.
- Collectively, grantees served nearly 587,000 children in 65 of Michigan's 83 counties.
- Grantees reported differing levels of experience purchasing local foods for food programs: 26% indicated that they had 10 years or more of experience (31 out of 119 grantees) while 19% indicated that they were newer to purchasing local foods (23 grantees), with one year or less of experience before participating in 10 Cents a Meal.

# IMPACTS FOR CHILDREN AND FOOD PROGRAMS

## Expanding Tastes

- Over three quarters of grantees (77%) reported that 10 Cents a Meal grants allowed them to try new products in their food program that they would not have otherwise tried.
- Grantees reported trying for the first time 42 types of vegetables and 18 types of fruits.
- The top ten new Michigan-grown foods reported by food program managers in evaluation surveys (in order) were apples, cherries, asparagus, dry beans, blueberries, lettuce, carrots, radishes, peaches, and cucumbers.
- Seventeen grantees reported purchasing Michigan-grown dry beans for the first time, the highest number reported in 10 Cents a Meal history.



Thanks to 10 Cents a Meal grants, Michigan kids tried wild ramps, honey berries, kohlrabi, romanesco, popcorn shoots, donut peaches, basil microgreens, mayocoba beans, leeks, rainbow carrots, balaton cherries, and more during the 2022-2023 program year.

## Increasing Food Access and Consumption

Most grantees agreed that their food program or food service operation was positively impacted through participating in the program. Food program managers reported that 10 Cents a Meal:

- Allowed them to offer more local fruits to students and children (82%),
- Allowed them to offer more local vegetables (72%),
- Increased fruit consumption among students and children (73%), and
- Increased vegetable consumption among students and children (65%).

## Outcomes for Food Programs

Food program managers reported that the top five outcomes (in order) that 10 Cents a Meal helped food program operations achieve were:

- The variety of produce served in the food service program has increased (108 grantees),
- Food purchasing budget increased (91 grantees),
- Ability to plan local produce and dry bean purchasing with greater certainty (86 grantees),
- Purchasing power was enhanced (77 grantees), and
- Ability to meet school meal requirements (51 grantees).

## Engaging Students, Children, and Community

Nearly 70 grantees reported that taste tests were conducted during the grant year. Altogether, they reported 42 different Michigan-grown foods tried through taste tests. The top five Michigan-grown foods that were taste tested (in order) were apples, cherries, blueberries, asparagus, and carrots.

The top five activities to support local foods served through the 10 Cents a Meal as reported by grantees were:

- Promotional posters (18% of total activities reported),
- Nutrition education in the cafeteria (11%),
- Taste testing (10%),
- Social media (9%), and
- Harvest of the month menu feature (7%).

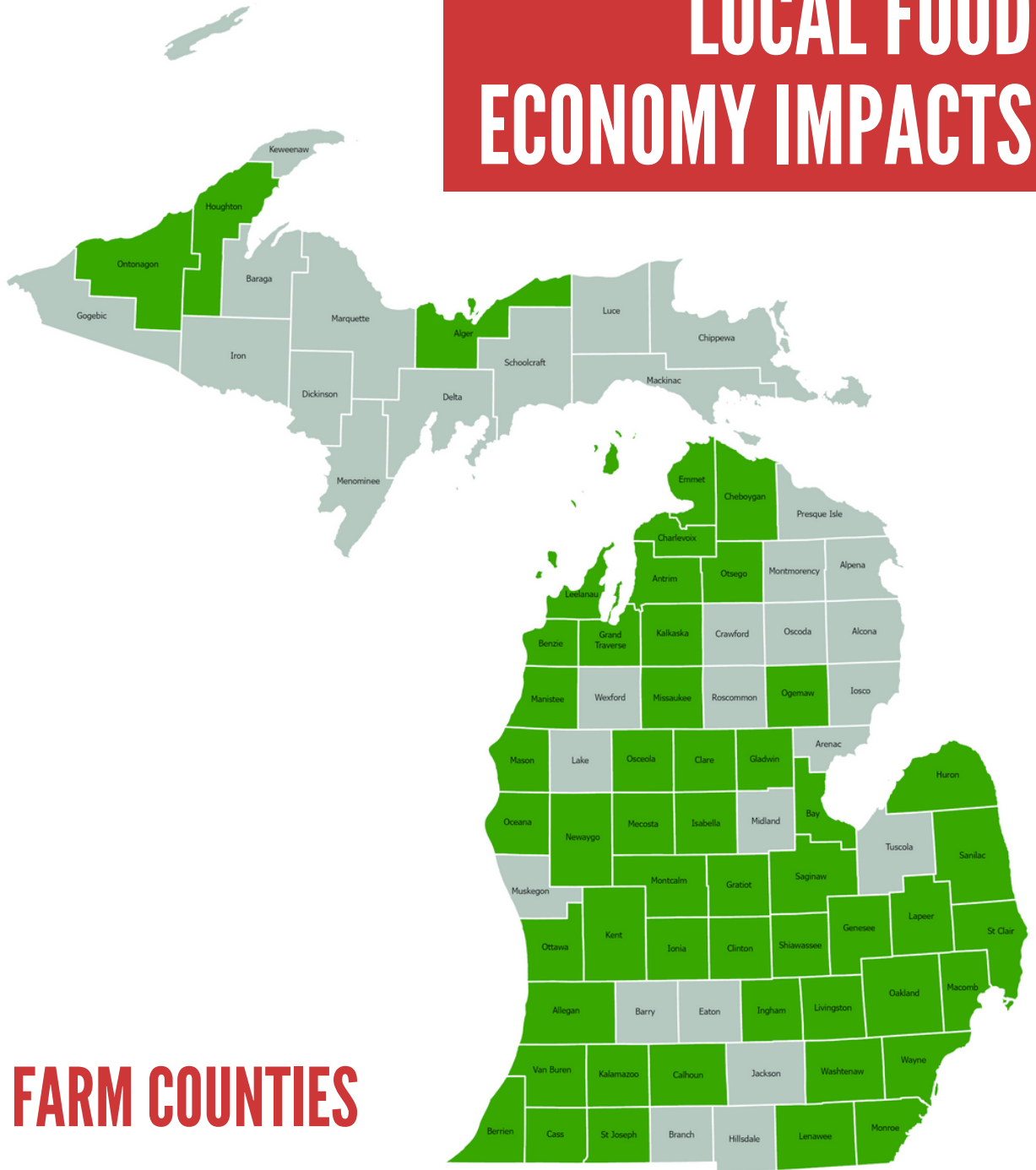

## Early Care and Education Settings

- 15 grantees (about 6% of all grantees) were ECE sites.
- Of those, nine ECE grantees reported that they served new Michigan-grown fruits, vegetables, or dry beans for the first time. These included 15 new types of vegetables, seven types of fruits, and two varieties of dry beans.
- The top five types of activities (in order) that ECEs conducted to support local food purchasing were taste testing, promotional posters, on-site garden activities, nutrition education in the classroom, and social media.

# LOCAL FOOD ECONOMY IMPACTS



## 52 FARM COUNTIES

Grantees purchased more than **62 varieties** of fruits, vegetables, and dry beans grown by over **185 farms** in **52 counties** according to invoices.

*An additional 50 businesses such as distributors, processors, packers, and food hubs were impacted.*



## Market Opportunities

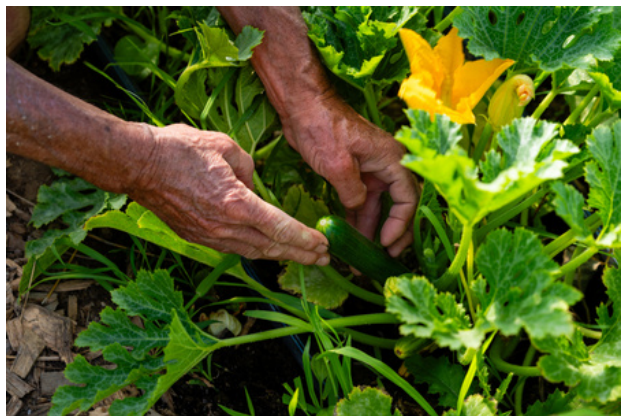

- Over 60 grantees (of 196 responding grantees) reported at least once throughout the year that there were Michigan-grown fruits, vegetables, or dry beans they wanted to use but have not been able to find or buy.
- The top ten Michigan-grown foods of interest among food program managers (in order) were peaches, tomatoes, cherries, asparagus, corn, green beans, blueberries, melons, strawberries, and celery.

## Farm Supply Chain Impacts

- Half of grantees reported that participation in 10 Cents a Meal allowed them to make connections with new farmers or food suppliers (52%) and to improve existing relationships with farmers or local food suppliers (52%).
- Five ECE grantees reported that 10 Cents a Meal allowed them to connect with new farmers or local food suppliers, and four said it allowed them to improve existing relationships.
