## Motivation

Why are you running for *this* office?

I'm running because the Outer Sunset is my home. I'm a renter, parent, former cooperative member, and producer of Sunset Solos who wants to protect seniors, renters, families, small businesses, and public spaces like Sunset Dunes. District 4 deserves leadership rooted in lived experience and collaboration.

What are your values, and how did you get them?

My values come from family, community, and lived experience. I was raised by a teenage mother and a step-father who taught me responsibility, empathy, and showing up for others. Helping care for my mother-in-law at home at the end of her life deepened my belief in dignity, compassion, and aging in place. My artistic and cooperative work and years working with kids have reinforced my commitment to collaboration, creativity, and care.

What communities do you represent, and how do they hold you accountable?

I represent renters, parents, artists, small business owners, and families in the Outer Sunset. I'm accountable through the communities I work with every day – as a campus coordinator, community arts producer, and neighbor – where trust is built through showing up, listening, and following through.

What three endorsements are you most proud of?

I don't have formal endorsements yet. The three I'm most proud of are the neighbors who stop me to say "keep going," the parents and students I work with as a campus coordinator, and the solo performance artists who have built community with me over the years.

What are the top three issues you will work on, and what is your plan for achieving your goals?

1) Protect renters, seniors, and expand community ownership.

I will strengthen tenant protections, support aging in place, and grow community land trusts so housing remains permanently affordable and community-controlled.

2) Keep Sunset Dunes a park and build its next phase with neighbors.

I will protect it from reopening to cars and lead a transparent, community-driven process so families, seniors, and residents help shape its future design.

3) Launch an all worker-owned cooperative initiative.

I want to help the neighborhood businesses we rely on stay in place and create pathways for people who want to start a business together but don't have access to funding, through an all worker-owned cooperative initiative.

How I'll achieve this:

By staying accessible, building coalitions, and moving practical legislation and funding that reflects community priorities.

What local and state commissions or policy bodies have you served on?

I have not served on local or state commissions. I've spent my time bringing arts to the Outer Sunset through Sunset Solos at Sealevel Gallery, working as a campus coordinator at an independent school, and as a former worker-owner at Other Avenues Co-op, where I ran a small business with 20 other people in a democratic workplace.

What political organizations are you a member of (e.g., democratic clubs)?

I am not currently a member of any political organizations or democratic clubs.

What for-profit or non-profit boards have you served on, including political organizations?

I have not served on formal boards. My experience has been in community-based arts, education, and cooperative work.

**What campaigns have you worked on?**

I phone banked for Michael Dukakis's 1988 presidential campaign, participated in the 1991 medical marijuana campaign in Santa Cruz, and walked door to door encouraging voters to support Kathleen Brown's 1994 campaign.

**What recent candidates and ballot measures have you supported financially?**

I financially supported the presidential campaigns of Joe Biden and Kamala Harris

**What is one concrete thing about the League of Pissed Off Voters (for example, something we have done, said, or published) that you appreciate and that would make you proud to have our endorsement?**

I've relied on the League of Pissed Off Voters' yearly endorsements as part of my own voting strategy for many years. I appreciated your endorsement of Gordon Mar for Supervisor because it reflected a commitment to community-rooted, progressive leadership. Mar also nominated Other Avenues as a Legacy Business, something I worked on when I was a worker-owner there. I respect that the League centers grassroots voices and clear values, and I'd be proud to earn your endorsement.

**How long have you lived in your supervisor district? If you have not lived in your district continuously, when is the most recent time you moved back to your district and why?**

### How would you explain the biggest challenges your district faces?

The biggest challenge facing District 4 right now is instability and division. The fight over Sunset Dunes and the recall of Supervisor Engardio created real fractures in the neighborhood and disrupted consistent leadership. As a result, the district hasn't had steady representation focused on long-term community priorities.

We need to move beyond these fractures and focus on protecting public space, supporting renters and seniors, and rebuilding trust in local leadership. District 4 deserves consistent, community-rooted leadership.

### What do you feel are your district's biggest opportunities?

Sunset Dunes is one of District 4's biggest opportunities – not only for the neighborhood, but for San Francisco as a whole. It can be a model for what happens when we reclaim street space for people: a place for families, seniors, kids, and neighbors to gather, breathe, and build community. Done right, it shows how public space can strengthen mental health, connection, and neighborhood pride.

### In what ways would your work as supervisor align with, or be different from, the last supervisor from this district?

I respect anyone who steps up to serve, but my approach would be more community-rooted, cooperative-based, and collaborative. While I support keeping Sunset Dunes a park, I also believe many residents did not feel heard in how decisions were made. As Supervisor, I would prioritize building consensus early and making sure neighbors are meaningfully involved before major neighborhood changes move forward.

I would place stronger emphasis on housing stability, aging in place, cooperative economic development, and protecting public space, with a leadership style grounded in accessibility, transparency, and ongoing dialogue.

Do you support getting rid of district elections for the Board of Supervisors? Why or why not?

No. I support district elections because they ensure neighborhoods have direct representation at City Hall. Moving to at-large elections would centralize power and make it harder for District 4 to have its specific needs heard.

At-large systems also tend to increase the influence of well-funded special interests that may not have District 4's best interests at heart. District elections keep supervisors accountable to the people who live in and know their neighborhoods.

Which specific city services do you feel should be protected from budget cuts, but have not been?

Services that support seniors aging in place, tenant protections, health care, and neighborhood public space should be protected from cuts. That includes senior services, community health programs, eviction defense and tenant counseling, public library branches, park maintenance, and community-based arts and youth programs.

These are preventative, stabilizing services that keep people housed, connected, and healthy – and cutting them only creates bigger, more expensive problems down the line.

Please describe your familiarity with the City Charter. Please give specific examples of what you would change in the charter, and what you think is important to preserve.

I understand the argument that the City Charter has become overly long and procedural after decades of amendments, and I am open to thoughtful modernization that improves transparency, efficiency, and accountability. However, I do not support reforms that concentrate more power in the Mayor's office or weaken democratic checks and balances.

Specifically, I do not support granting the Mayor broad hire-and-fire authority over department heads or eliminating independent commissions in ways that reduce public oversight. I believe commissions and boards should be improved and better supported, not hollowed out.

What I believe is important to preserve are district elections, independent oversight bodies, the Board of Supervisors' ability to place measures on the ballot, and voter-approved funding protections for essential services like housing, health care, and senior supports.

If the Charter is updated, I would prioritize clarifying lines of responsibility, improving procurement and contracting transparency, and modernizing processes in ways that strengthen accountability to communities – without centralizing power or limiting public participation

Please describe your familiarity with the Board of Supervisors budget process. How would you approach the City's budget? What would you prioritize? How would you ensure community voices are represented?

I understand that the Mayor proposes the budget and the Board of Supervisors reviews, amends, and approves it through committee hearings and public input. I see the budget as the City's most important policy document.

I would prioritize housing stability, senior services, health care access, tenant protections, and maintaining parks and neighborhood public spaces. Preventative services that keep people housed, healthy, and connected should be protected.

To ensure community voices are represented, I would hold regular district budget meetings, work with neighborhood groups and service providers, and be transparent about trade-offs and decisions.

Under what circumstances do you think it's appropriate for the Board of Supervisors to delegate its oversight function to the Mayor?

I generally don't believe the Board should give up its oversight role. Checks and balances matter, and the Board exists to provide accountability.

The only time limited delegation makes sense is in true emergencies or very narrow situations, and even then it should be temporary, transparent, and come with regular reporting back to the Board. The Board should always retain the ability to step back in.

How did you vote or would you have voted on Mayor Lurie's Family Zoning Plan? How would you explain your position to your constituents?

I would not have voted for the Mayor's Family Zoning Plan as written. I understand that we have to meet state housing requirements, and I support building more housing – but it needs to be done in a way that protects renters and ensures new housing is truly affordable.

I've seen in places like Santa Cruz how new development can move forward without meaningful community input and has changed the character of neighborhoods in ways that feel imposed rather than planned with residents. Growth should be thoughtful, community-informed, and paired with strong tenant protections so existing residents are not displaced.

I support prioritizing permanently affordable housing, community land trusts, and cooperative housing built in the true spirit of worker-owned collectives. I would explain to my constituents that I support housing – especially deeply affordable, community-owned housing – but I will not support plans that weaken renter protections or prioritize market-rate development without safeguards.

Whose voices are not being heard at City Hall? What new voices would you bring in to City Hall?

Too often, the voices of renters, seniors, working families, artists, youth, and longtime neighborhood residents are not being heard at City Hall. People who are juggling jobs, caregiving, and housing costs don't always have the time or access to navigate political systems, and their perspectives get overshadowed by well-funded interests.

I would bring in the voices of parents, students, renters, seniors aging in place, educators, solo performance artists, and cooperative workers – people who live the consequences of City policy every day. I believe City Hall should better reflect the full range of San Franciscans, not just those with money or political connections.

Did you join educators at the UESF picket line during the strike? Which school site did you go to, when, and why?

I supported educators 100 percent. One of my earliest political memories is listening to my grandmother speak at a teachers' union meeting, and I've always believed in standing with working people.

I was not able to join the picket line during the strike because I live paycheck to paycheck and do not have savings, so missing work was not financially possible. I currently work as a campus coordinator at an independent school, and I see every day how much educators give to their students. I stood in solidarity with their demands and strongly support fair pay, smaller class sizes, and fully funded schools.
