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Motivation

Why are you running for *this* office?

There seems to be too much performative politics going on. No one seems to really be focused on making things better and solving problems that we have here... I feel the reasons center around a tendency to have people in City Hall with an agenda. An intention to push ideology or empower one activist group over the rest of us in the city. Instead of things getting fixes, we get demonstrative artificial fixes, not a real solution...

I'm running because I wanna have effective solutions to our real problems.

What are your values, and how did you get them?

I value common sense, logic, & efforts that focus on actually fixing a problem. Not just window dressing or feel good solutions. I also value people being frank and open with each other. A lot of that came from my upbringing in Pennsylvania and the East Coast in general. The rest of it came from my 23 years in both the Navy and the Coast Guard.

What communities do you represent, and how do they hold you accountable?

Renters, those not making mid to high six figure incomes, and those who simply want a clean and safe place to live. I never forgot where I came from and how hard it is to have those small successes in life. I grew from what was once called a hood to a life where I can represent (and be held accountable) to any group that wants action and results.

What are the top three issues you will work on, and what is your plan for achieving your goals?

- 1 affordability
- 2 our fentanyl crisis
- 3 quality of life

There is no reason why anyone working a full-time job in San Francisco can't afford to live here in their own apartment. Same goes for the elderly & military veterans... Housing affordability is basically straightforward. More available housing drives down prices. But what we keep getting is more high-end, apartments and condos. Ones that often sit empty as investment properties or become short stay properties. Maybe with a few token apartments at or below market level just to say they have it.....Between 30 and 40% of the cost to create an apartment goes to navigating bureaucracy and getting through legal roadblocks.... The first step to affordability is cutting out those roadblocks that prevents unused office space from being converted into living spaces... as long as those spaces are selling at or below market value...

The next step is to convince companies and individuals who have prospered in San Francisco to take an active part. Not by handing over larger and larger amounts of taxes to the city. But by taking an active role in constructing new housing or converting unused office space into apartments that bartenders hotel workers, the people that keep the city going can easily afford. In exchange, the wealthy and large businesses that make this possible get tax breaks, positive publicity, and the ability to make a solid positive difference in the city.

San Francisco loses two people to drug overdoses every day. Fentanyl is a drug today that not only destroys a user's body, but completely rewire his brain. No matter how bad things get, getting help or even quitting is no longer a thought. The only way we're going to get a handle on this is to target every dealer selling fentanyl in the city. Because too often those dealers end up right back on the streets, they should be turned directly over to the feds for prosecution. That means the FBI and DEA. Anyone that knows me knows that there is a lot about our current administration I find repulsive. However, these dealers that are destroying thousands of lives here in the city (quite literally murdering 2 per day) we need to ensure the guilty face consequences.

Everybody that lives in San Francisco deserves to have the same quality of life no matter the neighborhood. No one should have to see trash piled up outside of their building. Or an open air drug or stolen goods market on the corner. Or gang activity & gunfire. Police should respond as quickly in less wealthy areas as they do in wealthy areas. Just because someone isn't making six digit income should not mean that they have to have a poor quality of life.... A huge chunk of this can be fixed by attacking the fentanyl issue. But also by hiring enough police and support and have effective programs to help addicts get through rehab and recovery.

Board supervisors should be chosen by their own district. I do realize that in my own case, I might have a much better chance of winning if this were a citywide race. However, there is a lot to be learned from the great American Highway/Sunset dunes situation. Although the locals in that area wanted to keep the highway open on weekdays, their neighborhood had a decision imposed on them by outsiders who didn't have to live with the consequences. In the same way, it should be the district itself that elect its own supervisor.

Emergency situations. Earthquakes and natural disasters. Public health crisis, i.e. pandemics. Public safety crisis, such as spikes in crime, crime and fentanyl.

How did you vote or would you have voted on Mayor Lurie's Family Zoning Plan? How would you explain your position to your constituents?

I support the Family Zoning Plan because it adds needed housing to the area. But San Francisco has the lowest percentage of families with children of any major city in the US. So the question becomes: "Who is all this housing for?" Sure, 25% designated for apartments with 2 or more bedrooms doesn't sound like much. But only 18% of San Franciscans have 1 or more children. Being that rent is largely figured by square footage, it seems not to REALLY answer the housing needs we have here. I feel expanding housing needs to be focused more on affordable studio and 1 bedroom apartments for single individuals and couples. This more matched our city's needs and demographics.

Whose voices are not being heard at City Hall? What new voices would you bring into City Hall?

The voice of us working class, the voice of us renters. The voice of us who just want to see issues fixed. The voice of us who want a clean, safe, affordable city that's fun to live in as the person we truly are. The voice of us who wants their government to work. The voice of us tired of divisive politics and labels. AND the voice of us who want SF to be a magnet of diversity. Where we don't all have to agree with each other, but we can accept who we all are, and that we're all a part of what is San Francisco.

Did you join educators at the UESF picket line during the strike? Which school site did you go to and why?

No. I was working.

How will you vote on the Affordable Housing Guarantee Act in the November election? Explain your position.

I'm in favor of trying almost anything that brings down the cost of having a place to live in San Francisco, as long as it doesn't damage the city's economy and drive away tax paying businesses. It's my understanding that the hang up is on "Social Housing" which is a place controlled by tenants. We need to have multiple options available to create an affordable city. This idea is funded by property sales and real estate transactions over \$10 million. Sounds good to me.

How will you vote on the Mayor's Clean Up City Hall ballot measures on the November ballot? Explain your position.

What we have right now isn't working. I think we all can agree. Our system is bloated. It consumes money that should be going to fixing our issues, and funding programs that work. Our current system puts up unnecessary barriers to everything from new housing to individuals trying to open a new small business. Two of the things we desperately need to expand in our city.
