Also, thanks to Julie and others who helped to transition the work which helped to ensure that the new website was realized.</li> <li>Malinda provided thanks to the work of the Phin Park and Greening Committee, co-chairs Lori and Jeff for all their work with the TRCA for the Tiny Forest along with the new signs both in Phin Park and around the Tiny Forest which is at the edge of the dog park by the TTC yard.</li> <li>The PCA was also approached in the fall by one of our residents due to concern of the porch thefts and safety in the neighbourhood. 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Treasurer's Report	<ul> <li>Martin informed a small deficit has been experienced, which is a bit of a hangover from COVID. Donations were down by approximately \$500.</li> <li>Overall, the PCA has substantial cash resources of \$14,700 as of the end of December. The previous year's cash resources were \$15,000. Some of these funds are held on behalf of a grant for which we are waiting for the city to kick it off.</li> <li>Some of the Pocket Change Committee expenses were supported and they are actively applying for and receiving grants.</li> <li>The Wandering Spirit School's annual Powwow project was supported again this year with the financial management of funds that were granted.</li> </ul>

		performances of the Three Musketeers in the park. Thanks to wonderful local actors who donated
		their time, we enjoyed an afternoon of free music & refreshments. We hope to welcome them
		back again this summer!
	0	Tiny Forest
		$\cdot$ In August, the Pocket had a site preparation for its very own Tiny Forest. This is a project that is
		led by the TRCA's Sustainable Neighbourhood Action Program (SNAP), in partnership with the City
		of Toronto, the Pocket Community Association (PCA), and the Network of Nature.
		• In September there was a very successful planting event, which was really well attended with
		many people out to plant the Tiny Forest which now is growing happily at the top of the Off Leash Oakvale Green Space.
	0	Park in the Dark
	0	· In late October, before Halloween, we partnered again with TRCA on another very cool
		educational event called Park in the Dark. It happened at nighttime and the event was sold out.
		Many kids and families came in costumes to carve pumpkins and learn about nocturnal neighbours.
	0	Pumpkin Parade
		· The day after Halloween, we had our very special pumpkin parade with hundreds of pumpkins
		lining the walkways of Phin Park. We had a very big crowd with countless smiling people of all ages
		who enjoyed the carved pumpkins, glowing on a lovely evening, while enjoying popcorn, hot
	_	chocolate & other refreshments. Santa's Frozen Festival
	0	• Resident Donna Lee and a team of local volunteers organized this December event. We had about
		15 vendors participating in the Holiday Pop-Up Shops in Phin Park to sell their wares. The event
		also entailed another nighttime parade that included a dinosaur, reindeer, dreidel, elves & of
		course Santa & Mrs. Claus.



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	<ul> <li>In keeping with the Pocket's community spirit, the important tradition of charitable contribution was continued with this event.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Indigenous Fire &amp; Storytelling Community Event</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>In January there was yet another very cool Pocket-Snap community event run by the TRCA. For the first time in the Pocket, we had an Indigenous fire and storytelling. Kandy Kennedy of Kennedy Indigenous Consulting and Wildlife Education came to speak and share traditional stories.</li> <li>Phin Park Rink</li> </ul>
	• In the winter we had the Phin Park Rink. Pocket residents Corey, John, Karina, Mark, Michael, Lori,
	Omer, Steve and Jeff, along with a few of their kids, again formed an awesome team to create and maintain a skating rink in Phin Park.
	<ul> <li>These volunteers flooded, swept &amp; scraped, to make an awesome place to safely skate &amp; play hockey.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>The rink was ready on January 18th. Despite all the incredible efforts to make this happen, Mother Nature didn't cooperate and the rink was thwarted by unseasonably warm temperatures which made the skating very short lived.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Community Safety Townhall</li> </ul>
	• In February, a Community Safety Townhall event was hosted in the beautiful auditorium space of the Wandering Spirit School. This was prompted by a few concerned residents of the Pocket as a result of some recent crimes in the neighbourhood.
	<ul> <li>We had two safety presentations from our local community police offers, Officer Brittany Sunega and Joel Main from the Division 55, as well as TTC special constables, Ricky Hosein and Teresa Lui.</li> <li>The event was very successful, bringing about 25 residents out to listen to the safety presentations and ask questions.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>April Spring Fling &amp; Easter Egg Hunt</li> <li>On March 30th the Spring Fling included another incredible Easter Egg Hunt. It was incredibly</li> </ul>
	popular again this year, with hundreds of kids and families participating. To prepare, volunteers cleaned up Phin Park the day before. On the big day, there were refreshments, bunny photos, vendors and a charity raffle thanks to generous donors.
	<ul> <li>Big shout out to Donna Lee, an enormous community contributor for many years, as well as Jeff</li> <li>Otto and Dean Miller for doing all the heavy lifting for this amazing event.</li> </ul>

	<ul> <li>Just a few weeks ago we had our annual street sale. Although the weather was rainy, the event still attracted hundreds of people to dozens of homes where treasures of all sorts were sold or given away. Many set up shop on Sunday as well when we had many more people come out to the neighbourhood. Several sellers donated what they collected to charities, including PWA (People with AIDS Foundation), Eastview and others.</li> <li>Pocket Pride Parade</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>This hasn't happened yet, but a little plug for a very exciting event this weekend. The third Pocket</li> <li>Pride Pride Parade will be held. There will be a rainbow procession of two-wheeled &amp; four-wheeled</li> <li>vehicles &amp; costumed walkers.</li> </ul>

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	0 0 0 0 0	Last year was a very exciting time for the Pocket Change Project when it received front page coverage in the Toronto Star and coverage on CBC Radio and Television - in English and French! The big news this year has been sparking the creation of a home retrofit service for the whole city of Toronto, with financial help from The Atmospheric Fund and Toronto Hydro. It's called Toronto Home Retrofits until a branding company can find a better name. It will encourage a community- based approach along the lines of Pocket Change. They've hired an Executive Director who is now busy learning from our pioneering work here in the Pocket. The team is continuing to encourage more Pocket homeowners to retrofit their homes and get off the gas. The committee received a grant from the City of Toronto to assist low-income Pocket residents to better insulate their homes and reduce their carbon consumption. The committee conducted a survey of Pocket homeowners to help identify others who want to get on the retrofit road. The committee will be hosting another Eco Fun Fair in Phin Park on Sunday, September 22nd. David was pleased to report that the Parks People have just given a \$1500 grant so everyone in the Pocket can be invited to a large community feast that evening. So, save the date - Sept 22nd.

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	0	For the City's "Clean Toronto Together" weekend in April, the committee organized a one-day cleanup of Phin Park, the Dog Off-Leash Area and Oakvale Green. The day included removing
		invasive plants, as well as raising awareness about native plants and offering native seeds.
	0	"Leave the Leaves!" Our cleanup day included education about the importance of leaving organic
		matter in gardens until temperatures are steady at 10 C for at least 10 days to protect
		overwintering creatures. Plus, Councillor Fletcher provided her annual donation of a huge pile of
		compost for residents. Thanks were given to Paula.
	0	A few weeks after last year's AGM, TRCA staff & this committee co-hosted a small pollinators and
		planting event. As part of TRCA's Pocket SNAP (Sustainable Neighbourhood Action Plan), they
		donated native plants for our butterfly and pollinator gardens, as well as the shade garden that we co-created last year.
	0	The committee continued their native plant work with TRCA when they again partnered with
		TreeMobile to provide Pocket residents with free native shrubs & trees, which resulted in several
		dozen being delivered in April for planting in people's yards. Thanks were provided to TRCA $\&$
		TreeMobile.
	0	TRCA's Pocket SNAP support included the addition of four educational signs in Phin Park, which we co-developed with the approval of the PCA Board. The signage themes showcase: "pollinators" "benefits of trees", "shade garden plants" & our "herb garden" in various areas of Phin Park.
	0	With regard to the herb garden, the team recently prepared it for new growth, and passersby will
		soon see fresh herbs alongside returning perennials for everyone's personal culinary & medicinal
		use.
	0	Lori informed of exciting new that occurred on September 30. The Pocket experienced the
		culmination of about 2.5 years of discussion & planning when TRCA & our Committee hosted the
		Tiny Forest Planting Day! During this sold-out community-wide event, over 300 native shrubs &
		trees were planted. We also saw the installation of deer fencing to protect it during the first 3-5
		years of growth, as well as a temporary beautiful banner designed by Pocket resident Sullivan
		Dyment.
	0	In our agreement with the City & TRCA, the PCA Board committed to take a lead role in the
		monitoring and maintenance of the forest during the first 3-5 years. On June 2, several Committee
		members and another Pocket resident received our first training session from TRCA. All are invited



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	<ul> <li>to watch the growth of the Tiny Forest and to share comments and questions with the committee.</li> <li>If the team doesn't know the answer, they will be happy to find out.</li> <li>In closing, the Phin Park &amp; Greening Committee would like to thank everyone who is supporting our efforts to make The Pocket a more beautiful, safer, healthier and more environmentally sustainable place to live, work, go to school &amp; simply enjoy!</li> </ul>

Lori also informed that after the 3-5 year period, a new fence with a gate will be built so passersby can enter.</li> <li>Susan provided thanks to the PCA and event volunteers for their hard work over the last year. Susan informed that the responsibility of the off-leash dog park was transitioned from the PCA to the Dog Owners Association. However, the two members of this Association are no longer there. Susan asked whether the PCA can reach out to the community to see if anyone is interested in stepping in. New volunteers could then request new wood chips from the city. These volunteers will be able to manage directly with the city.
