# ENROLLMENT & BOOKS

This quarter was strong for growth in enrollment, with program activation and coverage completion in three counties. Snohomish, Skagit, and Adams counties completed full coverage, while King County added 20 new zip codes to their coverage area.

Number of Books Distributed this Quarter: 163,109




# ENROLLMENT DISTRIBUTION MAP & LEADERS



# **Partnerships**

ILWA has created a new partnership with the Washington Department of Corrections (DOC) to implement a program best practice by providing specially selected Imagination Library book sets to all correctional facilities in the state. During phase one, the partnership goal is to provide an opportunity for visiting children to learn, explore, and bond through books while visiting an incarcerated relative or friend. This practice helps develop literacy skills for incarcerated parents who need that boost, and at the same time creates a connection and bonding opportunity for the child and parent through visits or communications. DOC recently received a grant through the Second Chance Act, awarding them the opportunity to remodel child visit areas in three of the 12 correctional facilities in Washington, building out space for the Imagination Library to be present at these facilities.

Phase two will include expanding the partnership to the remaining DOC facilities, creating collaboration with the Reading to Me and Residential Parenting programs, and providing Imagination Library registration information to visiting families, allowing children of incarcerated individuals to receive monthly books at the homes where they currently reside.

This type of statewide partnership is considered a best practice by The Dollywood Foundation.

# Learnings

The ILWA team conducted a supplemental training for affiliates on May 23rd, educating them on a helpful report and data tool known as ALICE (Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed), which can be layered in with Imagination Library program data to show how much of their impoverished or vulnerable populations are engaged. Affiliates can use this data to be more informed on the make-up of their enrollment, and to help identify regions in their coverage that need more outreach and engagement. This data can also be helpful in recruiting funding to support local programs.

### What's Next

- Start a new contract partnership with the Department of Children, Youth, and Families
- Complete program expansion in the state so all early learners have program access
- Execute the Imagination Library of Washington Statewide Celebration with Dolly Parton
- Secure ongoing funding to sustain the program
- Continue creating statewide partnerships and collaborations
- Creatively and strategically promote the program so all Washington early learner families can enroll
