Gratitude and Impact

Dear Friends,

What we accomplished in 2023 significantly advanced our mission to relocalize the food system! **Vermont Farmers Food Center** purchased and sold more locally grown and produced food through our programs than in all previous years.

This record-breaking year was made possible by our growers, shoppers, and the generous support of hundreds of donors, local businesses, state and federal government programs, and foundations. And we are grateful for all of you!

In 2023, renovations in Farmers Hall continued and we started planning for the construction of the Produce Packing Center and Commercial Kitchen Center.

Here are a few other highlights from 2023:

- Online Market increased sales to individuals and businesses
- Heart of Vermont Agriculture began regional distribution and cross-docking with other Vermont food hubs
- Once again, Farmacy enrolled more people and purchased more local produce, improving participants' health and benefiting farmers
- Projects we piloted Rutland County Eats and Locally Yours continued as on-going programs administered in collaboration with our project partners
- Educational Workshop Series was launched with community partners
- Root Words returned with a special series on localization's importance

Here's what you made possible

Together, we made local food more accessible and increased sales for farmers in Rutland County. We raised awareness of localizing the food system and initiated the renovation of Farmers Hall to provide the necessary infrastructure for farmers and gathering space for the community.







Heart of Vermont Agriculture



Online Market added seven new farmers and food producers in 2023, purchased \$63,766 local produce for Farmacy and sold \$60,721 in local food and products to 282 individual consumers, and \$46,544 in bulk sales to 17 businesses and institutions. In 2023, we began distributing local food from Rutland County to other Vermont food hubs, expanding the market for our county's growers!

Farm to School was piloted in fall 2023 at six area schools with a \$23,573 Local Food for Schools grant from Vermont Agency of Agricul-

ture, Food and Markets. VFFC staff worked with the School Food Authorities to ensure that 80% of the revenue went to producers with the remaining 20% available for VFFC's storage and distribution. The pilot will continue through the end of the school year in 2024.

Workplace Wellness continued in 2023 with three business sites participating. Each week, employees made purchases through the Online Market and VFFC delivered to their workplace. The program gained momentum and popularity with employees!





Food Access

Farmacy: Food as Medicine increased participants to **250** in 2023 and has reached over **3,672** people and their households since 2015. Farmacy food shares were distributed for 15 weeks to eight sites in Rutland County.

This year, the Farmacy Project collaborated with 25 healthcare clinics, 11 for profit farms, and three non-profit farms. Over **37,500** pounds of local food were packed into Farmacy bags in 2023

Vermont Everyone Eats program came to an end in March after operating for 12 weeks in early 2023 and serving 34,193 restaurant-prepared meals in Rutland County. VFFC collaborated with 18 restaurant partners and 21 community partner organizations for distribution. Approximately 30% of the food purchased by restaurants was locally sourced.

Following the conclusion of Vermont Everyone Eats, VFFC piloted a county-level prepared meals effort.

Rutland County Eats. The pilot project operated for **36** weeks and served **3,258** meals prepared



by **15** restaurant partners and distributed by **eight** partner organizations and prepared to transition program administration to Slate Valley Cares. Over **52%** of the food purchased by restaurants was locally sourced.

Summer 2023, VFFC administered *Vermont Emergency Eats* for Rutland County to help residents affected by the season's floods. The emergency program lasted for 13 weeks in the summer and early fall serving 949 meals or redeemed meal vouchers with 10 participating restaurants or caterers reporting 57% of ingredients purchased locally.

In 2022, VFFC partnered with the Southwestern Vermont Council on Aging (SVCOA) to launch a pilot meal-kit program called *Eat at Home*. After the successful completion of the pilot, in 2023, the program continued on at SVCOA as a fresh produce distribution program and it was renamed *Locally Yours*.



In 2023, VFFC suppled and delivered local food for *Locally Yours*. VFFC delivered approximately **19,000** pounds of locally grown and produced food to five different senior centers located in Rutland and Bennington County.

Education

In 2023, VFFC collaborated with Slate Valley Community Action Network (now Slate Valley Cares), Rutland Parks and Recreation, and Come Alive Outside to organize the **2023 Educational Workshop Series**.

Twelve workshops were held at VFFC and in VFFC's Rotary Greenhouse, and at several locations throughout Rutland. The workshops covered topics from seed starting and identifying garden pests to preserving your harvest and canning basics and received rave reviews from participants!

Root Words podcast returned for a special five-part series to delve into VFFC's mission and vision through in-depth discussions with local, state, national, and international leaders on Localizing the Regional Food System, To Build a Community Food Web, Restoring Relationships, The Making of an Urban Food Center, and A Local Food Future. The special series' episodes have been downloaded over 750 times!








Infrastructure

Building renovations on Farmers Hall continued on the interior to replace the old concrete floor and install the vapor barrier and radiant heating. This summer and fall, exterior rennovations will begin as well as interior installation of new commercial kitchen equipment and cold storage.

When VFFC receives final approval from the Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation, Farmers Hall may proceed with occupancy. VFFC's staff and advisory committee are conducting operating planning for the expanded facilities and in discussions with tenants and potential tenants to plan for the resumption of daily operations.

The change to <u>USDA's organic regulations</u> in 2023 requires food hubs to obtain organic certification to be able to label food as certified organic and create greater transparency throughout the food chain. VFFC's Operations Manager participated in organic certification training with representatives from other Vermont food hubs so that VFFC will be a certified food center in 2024!

VFFC's nearly three-acre campus in the heart of downtown Rutland, includes a combined 34,400 square feet of storage, distribution, food preparation and educational space across five buildings, is being transformed into a thriving food hub advancing the re-localization of the region's food system.







Volunteers make all the difference

From bagging Farmacy shares, and delivering to homes and distribution sites, to caring for the campus grounds and tending our community gardens, our **volunteers make it happen at VFFC**.




For 2023, the national value of each volunteer hour was \$31.80. Last year, our volunteers dedicated around 494 hours of their time making the value of VFFC's volunteer efforts worth \$15,709!

In 2023, VFFC received \$531,156 from Vermont Everyone Eats to coordinate and close out the federal pandemic relief program for the Rutland region. In combination with our other revenue sources, this grant represented 63% of our total revenue for 2023.
