- 1 The Women's Equality Party Conference 2022 reaffirms the party's core objectives of equal
- 2 representation by and in the media and notes that the British media is backsliding on both counts
- 3 with regressive and reductive coverage and losses in diversity in newsrooms and boardrooms.
- 4 Conference also recognises the wider context of economic and political pressure brought to bear on
- the BBC and other news media. The party calls on editors, producers and all others in positions to
- 6 influence commissioning decisions in news and media to:
- Have courage, speak truth to power and challenge stereotypes rather than reinforcing them.
 - Rigorously evaluate gatekeeping and commissioning processes and make any changes necessary to ensure a wider range of stories is told—and told better.

- Stop inviting feminists to debate whether feminism has gone too far (it hasn't) or treating debates about equality as prize fights. This approach positions urgent issues of interest to everyone as sideshows.
- Reject the false balance that insists fundamental rights, such as reproductive rights, are up for debate.
- Recognise that programmes and coverage with line ups which don't reflect the experiences of the population, fail the population.

Motion rationale:

- Public opinion, politics and policy, our culture, our future—all are shaped by the media and that means
- by those who decide which stories are told, how they are told and by whom.
- 19 Women can never achieve equality while misrepresented and underrepresented by the media. After
- some progress on this front, gains are being eroded and new fronts opened, both because of the so-
- called War on Woke which seeks to undermine equalities guaranteed by law and because newsrooms
- are contracting, often losing such limited diversity they previously had achieved.
- 23 In 2020, 75% of front-page stories across all major national daily newspapers (from the Daily Express
- to the Times and Sunday Times to the Guardian) were written by men. Women of colour are
- especially poorly represented across all forms of media. Research from Women in Journalism has
- 26 found only 12% of reporters are from a Black or minority ethnic background on mainstream
- 27 broadcasts², and that in an analysis of 723 prime time radio reporter appearances, only four were
- 28 Black women³.
- 29 Women are more likely to work in high-status professions and to have degrees and further degrees
- than their male counterparts. Nevertheless, female spokespeople are outnumbered 5-1 as expert
- commentators in the media⁴, or often requested to speak on siloed and trivialised aspects of women's
- 32 rights that undermine the feminist fight for equality.
- 33 The lack of meaningful representation, as well as the deliberate and harmful misrepresentation of
- women contributes to the regressive portrayals of women in the public eye. They are pitted against
- 35 each other, anatomised, found wanting. In turn, cynical and dismissive attitudes towards gender
- 36 equality are encouraged and rewarded, undermining the societal changes that are so urgently needed,

- Our Equality in the Media Objective will be strengthened by noting the shifts in the way the War on Woke has taken the (mis)representation of women to a new level, rebranding and reopening debates on battlegrounds already hard-fought over, and acknowledging the impact this has had and will continue to have on the feminist fight for equality.
