## **Motion text:**

- 1 Noting the UK Government's decision not to fund Evusheld on the NHS, Conference calls upon the
- 2 UK and devolved governments to:
- 3 Recognise the ongoing risk to health faced by people who are clinically vulnerable to COVID (most
- 4 of whom are disabled), and their carers, families, and supporters;
- 5 Recognise the social cost of failing to protect clinically vulnerable disabled people, their carers,
- 6 families, and supporters, including particularly the inability to take part in paid work and/or continue
- 7 to provide care if they or their families fall sick;
- 8 Mitigate against the gendered impact of COVID19 on clinically vulnerable disabled people, their
- g carers, and supporters, by following the clinical lead set by other countries 1 (who have found that it
- is a cost effective preventative measure) by providing anti-viral drugs (such as EVUSHELD2) to
- clinically vulnerable people before they catch COVID19.

## Motion rationale:

- 12 22% of the population (approximately 14.6 million people) is disabled<sup>3</sup> but 59.5% of COVID19-related
- deaths were of disabled people.<sup>4</sup> Mortality rates in disabled women were 2.4 times higher than in non-
- disabled women, whilst in men they were 2.0 times higher. Serious illness related to COVID19 also
- has had a gendered impact in the following ways:
- Disabled women have suffered loss of access to healthcare, social care and work, which has had a
- particular impact on households where disabled women are lone parents or sole earners<sup>6</sup>.
- The withdrawal of social care services due to COVID-related staff shortages meant 32% of people
- needed help from an unpaid carer who hadn't previously needed it<sup>7</sup>.
- 20 Women are 60% of the caring population providing full time care8. 72% of those receiving Carers
- 21 Allowance (which is lower than work-replacement benefits) are women<sup>8</sup>.
- Women are more than twice as likely as men to provide emergency care for a disabled relative, and
- to give up work to provide care, leading to a much higher risk of poverty for women and their families:9
- the average weekly income for families with disabled people and carers is £100 less than those
- without<sup>10</sup>, but the average weekly costs of living with a disability are £134.<sup>11</sup>

- 27 Despite it being UK Government approved and used in 32 countries<sup>12</sup> EVUSHELD is not currently
- available on the NHS to prevent COVID19 infection for clinically vulnerable people. The National
- 29 Institute for Clinical Excellence announced on the 17<sup>th</sup> October 2022 that they would not review this
- 30 decision until 2023<sup>13</sup>.
- 31 It is available privately for over £1000 per dose, every 6 months<sup>14 ii</sup>. 28% of families with a disabled
- member are in living poverty, compared to 17% of non-disabled families<sup>15</sup> they clearly cannot afford
- 33 to access this treatment privately.
